Course Description

This course is designed to provide students with a fundamental working knowledge of the technical, aesthetic, and conceptual aspects of digital imaging techniques, digital photography, and photographic software. Lectures, demonstrations, group/online discussions, and other online content will introduce various issues associated with the digital media presented and their accompanying technologies. Assigned projects, readings, presentations, online work and group critiques will assist in a critical understanding better preparing the student for further study in digital photography.

Objectives

- Demonstrate excellent understanding of the foundations of digital imaging and photography techniques, including manipulating, shooting, scanning, printing, and storing images.
- Demonstrate several advanced features in photographic software.
- Enhance your ability to think visually and communicate your ideas as such.
- Perfect your ability to discuss and defend your work and critique others in relation to concepts, ideas, techniques, processes, and experiences.
- Understand major developments in photographic arts as they have occurred throughout time.
- Develop a familiarity with the variety of media available in the photographic arts and understand the limitations and opportunities offered by these various materials and techniques.
- Demonstrate an excellent understanding of the components of art and design (balance, unity, line, composition, color theory, visual rhythm, etc...), and use this language to discuss, debate, and create.
- Gain an excellent working knowledge of the Mac computer and it's operating system

Make each project meaningful to yourself!
- Each assignment will culminate in a critique, which will consist of pinning up your work and/or projecting your completed work in class for all to see. All due dates will be

announced in the YELLOW BOX on UNM Learn, as well as on the syllabus. No full credit will be given for any late work. If an assignment is not presented on time, an automatic 0 will be issued. You will need to make arrangements with me if you are planning to make-up the work, and a fair grade will be issued once the work has been submitted, presented, and critiqued, minus an automatic one letter grade deduction.

 Incompletes are rarely issued. If 75% of the semester's work/projects/deliverables and participation/attendance have been completed with a satisfactory grade, and incomplete may be issued.

Methods of instruction include in-class lectures, demonstrations, discussions, work-time, and project critique/presentations. There will also be supplemental out-of-class and online instruction/ homework that will include watching required video tutorials.

In-Class Lectures, Demonstrations, Discussions, Work Time – each week we will meet twice on campus. A variety of issues will be presented and discussed.

Project Presentations and Critiques – There will be a total of 5 projects due throughout the semester. Guidelines will be detailed weekly in class, on the syllabus, and in UNM Learn. On days where you present your finished work to the class, we will come together as a group to critique the work and provide feedback to each other.

Video Tutorials – In the Weekly Learning Module in UNM Learn, the student will access links to online video tutorials introducing, explaining, and/or reviewing techniques and concepts current to the material covered in the classroom. Students must watch the required online video tutorials in a timely manner, within the week they are posted, and before the class in which we will be discussing the content of the tutorials.

Project 1: Before & After

Objective:

To introduce the basic functions, tools, and workspace of Photoshop. To encourage you to explore the Photoshop interface and make discoveries on your own.

Image:

Using your own work, choose an image to manipulate. Use the tools you were introduced to and those you would like to play with to create another image using the source file as one layer in the final product. The image will be projected for critique and does not need to be printed.

Project 2: Subject & Abstractions

Objective:

Select a subject. Decide why this is an interesting subject to shoot. Demonstrate your knowledge of digital photographic techniques through use of shooting your own digital images. Demonstrate your knowledge of digitizing images (negatives, prints, photos, 3-dimensional objects, etc...). Think up, compose, shoot, and print four images based on these criteria:

Set 1: Shoot as many pictures as needed. Consider panning, subject movement, and depth of field. Print three different views of this image: the entire object, a close-up, and an abstraction. Images must be **at least 5" x 7".**

<u>Set 2:</u> Using one of the images from Set 1 as a layer, create a collage in Photoshop using layers, masks, blending modes, opacity levels, and more. Print one large format image **at least 11" x 17".**

You will present **four printed images** at critique for this project: entire object (1), a close-up of the object (1), an abstraction of the object (1), and a Photoshop digital collage (1).

Project 3: Media/Social Critique using Lighting

Objective:

To introduce the wide variety of possibilities of digital imaging and photography, including advertising and the media. To critique advertisements and create your own dramatic statement using your knowledge of media techniques and lighting to create mood, shock, and other effects. To use Photoshop to enhance your effects, as well as add text. This is a poster and must therefore be printed VERTICALLY.

Image:

Take a digital photograph using the backdrop and studio lighting. Choose an object(s) and/or theme that you will use in an advertisement, campaign, and/or commentary. Use lighting to make the image(s) as dramatic or static as you choose, but use the lighting intentionally! Print an image **no smaller than 17" x 11"** as a poster with vertical (not horizontal) orientation for this project.

Project 4: History & Influences: Artist Presentation & Inspiration Prints

Objective:

Research the history of photography. Discover what influences photographers have on their artwork. Choose an artist and create prints using a similar style (response, inspired...) as your chosen artist. Observe print presentation, choices, lighting, and content of an artist you admire. Through the process of working in a similar style, you should become more aware of camera position, lighting, and personal style in both the artist you are using as an inspiration and your own developing style.

Process:

Select a contemporary or historical photographer that you like. Find out about his/her life, his/her work, the time period in which they work/worked, and what influences/influenced his/her work. Use the textbook, library, Internet, ArtStor, UNM Learn, etc.... as sources.Create a 5 minute presentation of the artist and their work, and then present your inspiration prints. You can choose your own format – slideshow (PowerPoint, Keynote, Google Office, etc...), video, etc...You must include at least 15 images of the artists work and at least 5 of your own. You will present the to the class.

Set:

Using the artist's influences as your own, shoot as many pictures as needed using digital techniques. You will present these images digitally to the class as part of your presentation.

Project 5: Final Project – Personal Voice/Self-Directed Series

Objective:

Create a series of work based on a self-directed subject matter agreed upon in the individual meeting with the instructor. Think – theme, series. Consider – Stop Motion

Process:

Shoot and either print or project compositions and/or stop motion animations that will explore the development of a common idea and/or subject through the use of multiple imagery. Shoot and print as much as needed. Create a small series (**6 to 10 individual photos**, **at least 8" x 10"**) exploring the use of photography as an extension of your own voice. Create a narrative – tell us a story (personal, fiction, political, etc.)
