#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This is a college course that requires both reading and writing. As a web-enhanced course, all handouts must be downloaded from *UNM Learn* before each unit starts. Designed to introduce students to the basic sociological concepts, this course will help students to better understand how culture and socialization influence one's behaviors and worldviews. In addition to promoting a clearer understanding of the impact of the social, political, and economic environments on individual lives, this course will also examine the relationships between social structures and one's personal lives.

#### EXAMS (60% OF COURSE GRADE)

A total of four exams will be given. The average of all exams accounts for 60% of your course grade. Format for scheduled exams includes true/false, multiple choice, matching, fill-in-the-blanks, and short answer essays. All exams are closed book and closed notes. No make-up exams or re-takes are given. If you miss the first exam, you will be dropped from the course unless you contact me prior to exam and provide bona fide documentation. Under extenuating circumstances, only ONE make-up exam is permitted with supporting documents from a third party. Make-up exam is essay exam and has to be taken before the scheduled exam. Be sure to have your Lobo ID with you on exam days.

If UNM closes on the day of final exam because of inclement weather or other reasons, your final course grade will be calculated based on all work assessed up to that point during this semester. It includes the grades from: (1) the first three exams, (2) three video reflection essays, (3) your class participation, and (4) all of your earned extra credit.

#### PARTICIPATION GRADE: LEARNING TEAM ACTIVITY SHEET (10% OF COURSE GRADE)

Class session format includes lectures, group activities, videos, and/or small group discussions. Students are randomly assigned to Learning Teams of three. Your team is to take quizzes together, discuss materials, give review as *subject experts*, and participate in team activities throughout the semester. As a team, you are to assign a speaker at each class session. The assigned speaker will speak for the team in class. To earn credit, your team is to submit the Learning Team Activity Sheets at the end of each class sessions. On the sheet, your team is to write one concept learned and one that is still confused. You do not earn any grade for the day that you are absent, or when your team do not turn in the sheet. I hope you will find the class interesting and engaging because interest and engagement are valuable parts of your learning.

## PARTICIPATION GRADE: ASSESSMENT ASSIGNMENTS (10% OF COURSE GRADE)

Four course assessments are required--one for each unit. The average of the four assessments accounts for 10% of the course grade.

Unit (1): Note-taking Assessment Unit (2): Gratitude Assessment Unit (3): Self-esteem Assessment Unit (4): Implicit Bias Assessment

## VIDEO REFLECTION ESSAYS (VRE: 20% OF COURSE GRADE)

A total of three VREs are required. Students are required to watch a video and write a minimum of 250-word reflection essay, addressing the questions posted in the handouts.

All essays are due within the first five minutes of class sessions on their respective due dates. <u>No late work is accepted, nor is hand-written work.</u> The average of all essays accounts for 20% of course grade. Grading rubric will be provided on the assignment sheets.

## **Extra Credit Essays (ECE)**

Four extra credit essays (ECE) are offered. Each ECE is weighted to account for 2 points towards your final course grade.
