Course Description	This course will review the basic knowledge of human sexuality including anatomical, physiological, psychosocial and ethical components. Areas examined are reproduction, contraception, sexually transmitted disease, sexual health and sexual dysfunctions.
Student Learning Objectives	<ol> <li>Students will:         <ol> <li>Explain current research methods in human sexuality issues relevant to principles and theories that help promote a healthy sexual life.</li> <li>Identify female and male sexual anatomy and physiology, conception and contraception, pregnancy, childbirth, abortion, sexual behaviors and fantasies, sexual dysfunctions, sexual coercion, concepts about sexually transmitted diseases, AIDS, etc</li> <li>Describe developmental perspectives relevant to sexuality and childhood, adolescence, adulthood, sexuality and disability, sexuality over a lifespan, gender identity and sexual orientation, and gender roles.</li> <li>Describe psychosocial perspectives of loving and being loved, intimacy, relationships and communication and sexual relationships.</li> <li>Identify law, religious and ethical perspectives on sexuality.</li> <li>Identify evidence based research that has played in our understanding of human sexuality in a world of diversity.</li> </ol> </li> </ol>

	<b><u>Time Commitment</u></b> This class is 3 credits. A traditional 3-credit general-education class meets for approximately 3 hours per week for 16 weeks. Since this is an online class, the in-class time is replaced by learning from readings and chapter exercises.

Syllabus Quiz Students will read over the syllabus and complete the syllabus quiz, including signing an agreement at the end of the quiz, stating you read and understand the syllabus.
Introduction Video Instructions will be posted on UNM Learn. A webcam is needed. You will record an introduction video and comment on at least 2 other introduction videos from students. Please be respectful. This will allow us to get to know one another.
Quizzes Quizzes will cover assigned chapters, discussions, and assignments. The exams may contain a combination of any of the following: multiple-choice, matching, true or false, short answer, and fill in the blank.
Homework and Assignments You are required the read the chapters listed on the tentative schedule on UNM Learn as part of your homework. Late work will not be accepted. Additionally, it is strongly recommended that you check UNM Learn daily. The instructor will post course materials that are necessary for course work, including other readings on UNM Learn.
<b>Discussion Board</b> There will also be a weekly discussion topic which you are expected to participate in. Discussion topics correspond to the weekly reading assignments. Students are expected to be respectful and courteous to their instructor and other students.
Mid Paper A written description of a local agency, which deals with issues, related to human sexuality. Include the agency location, purpose, services provided, and cost of services. Examples: Local Fertility clinics, Planned Parenthood, Domestic Crisis Centers, etc
<b><u>Final Paper</u></b> FOUR SECTION TOPICS (20 Points Each): 1. Gender
<ul> <li>What determines gender? Consider chromosomes, physical appearance, personal choice Why do you think so? Support your argument with specific examples, mentioning at least 3 levels of determination, and give reasons for and against each level.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>2. Human Sexuality</li> <li>How has the perception of human sexuality changed over time? What are some of the influences that change the perception of sexuality over time? What important changes have occurred in your lifetime? What changes do you feel will occur in the next 25 years, and why?</li> <li>3. Laws</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>S. Laws</li> <li>What are the laws in our state regarding sexual activity, heterosexual versus homosexual marriage, partnership rights, adoption regulations for singles/couples/families, etc? Which laws do you agree and/or disagree with; why? Compare these with laws of at least two more states. How do they differ? How have these differences affected life for residences of these states?</li> <li>4. Difference &amp; Similarities</li> </ul>

	• Are the differences <b>or</b> the similarities between males and females more profound? Are males and females more alike or different; in what way? You may include physiological as well as cultural differences as long as you differentiate between them. Give several research and resource examples to support your position.
