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Course Description:

History of Art II examines art created during the following periods: Early Renaissance up to contemporary art.

The following courses, ARTH101, ARTH201, ARTH 202 are strongly recommended to all students in the study of art history and related studio areas.

Student Learning Objectives:

- By the end of the course, students will be able to analyze and critically interpret significant and primary texts and/or works of art.
- By the end of the course, students will be able to identify the artist, title, date and medium for a given set of images
- By the end of the course, students will be able to explain how a work of art functions as a part of a broader visual culture.
- By the end of the course, students will be able to understand and articulate the fundamental vocabulary and styles of visual art
- By the end of the course, students will be able to compare art forms, modes of thought and expression, and processes across a range of historical periods and or structures.
- By the end of the course, students will be able to recognize and articulate the diversity of human experience across a range of historical periods and/or cultural perspectives.

Reflection Papers:

Each week you will need to type out a written reflection based on a topic covered in the lecture. Your instructor will provide you with the topic at the end of the lecture. During some classes you will have time to start writing your reflection. If you do not finish, you must complete it outside of class. Your final response needs to be typed using standard 12 point font, double-spaced, and a minimum of half a page but no more than one page. Type your name, the reflection #, and the date in the upper right portion of the page. Only thoughtful, grammatically correct, spell checked, correctly formatted papers will receive credit. Papers must be submitted at the beginning of the following class they are assigned. No emailed reflections are accepted.
