Dean of Instruction Update

The Summer 2014 and Fall 2014 schedules were sent to Jon Lechel last Wednesday, and we expect to get print copies back in the first days of April; students will begin to be advised on April 7, and they will be allowed to register beginning April 21. Margaret Anaya took over responsibility for scheduling classes and adjunct/overload budgeting by term in the middle of the process, and the transition occurred seamlessly. Please stop in and give a shout-out of thanks to Margaret as well as to Tara Best and Laura Encinias who worked indefatigably to fulfill scheduling guidelines as we interviewed and hired a new Unit Administrator who will hopefully serve in the Academic Affairs office for many years to come!

Director of Nursing John Austin has tendered his resignation, effective April 4, to accept an administrative position at the Veterans Administration hospital in Albuquerque. We thank John for his leadership, teaching, and service in the early years of the Valencia Campus ADN degree program; there will be a potluck goodbye luncheon in the Academic Affairs office midday on Wednesday, April 2. I have just returned from an ACEN (Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing) Self-Study Forum with Interim Nursing Director Dianna Johnston and Nursing Lecturer Donna Ketcheson. We learned a lot, made or re-made some contacts with accreditors and nursing colleagues from other, often similar, institutions which should serve the program well as we prepare to address the six standards that comprise the Self-Study. There are many "take-aways" that we gleaned from the Forum, but one point is relevant to ALL of us: the primacy of Assessment: What are our assessment practices? What sorts of evidence are we collecting longitudinally and evaluating for improvement of student learning outcomes?

The biannual Branch Deans' meeting is occurring on the same day as this month's Faculty Assembly. Since this is my second-to-last Faculty Assembly, I have asked Division Chair Miriam Chavez to represent the Valencia Campus at the Wednesday, March 26, meeting that seems to be in the process of moving from the UNM-Gallup campus to UNM-Main as I am writing this Report. My sincere appreciation goes to Dr. Chavez for agreeing to represent our campus.

Amiee and Patricia were invited by the Teaching English in the Two-Year College (TYCA) folks to present at the TYCA all-day pre-conference workshop for the 4 Cs Conference in Indianapolis, Indiana, March 2014

At present, it seems that Taos Dean Randi Archuleta and Los Alamos Dean Cynthia Rooney will be continuing in their positions in 2014-2015, while the Gallup campus appears to be very close to identifying a successor to Interim Dean Neal Mangham who is trying assiduously to retire again (!) and who is currently in the office only one day per week. It is certainly my hope that Valencia Branch faculty members continue to connect with their colleagues at the other Branches: as we calibrate Main Campus mandates in terms of curriculum (e.g., the new MaLL {Mathematics Learning Laboratory}) as well as the imminent changes in freshman composition.

There are major changes in 1st-year composition requirements that have almost completed all of the approvals through Curriculum Workflow. The so-called "1st-Year Composition Stretch and Studio" responds to statewide and national pressure to move away from multi-tiered Remedial English. Associate Provost Heileman has provided data to the deans to show that students who are placed into the lowest level of remediation have a likelihood of ever achieving a degree or certificate that is in the low single digits! Main Campus will be using an ACT score of 19 as the demarcation point. If a student is at or above that level, s/he may proceed directly to ENGL 110 (Accelerated Composition, 3cr.), pka ENGL 101. For students below that level (we will likely use a TBD Compass score for placement at the Valencia Campus), they will have the option of: (1) "Stretch": taking ENGL 111 (Composition I, 3cr.) and ENGL 112 (Composition II, 3cr.) in successive Fall/Winter or Summer/Fall sequential terms; (2) "Studio": taking ENGL 113 (Enhanced Composition, 4cr.). In either of the two scenarios, the second portion of the composition requirement is fulfilled by ENGL 120 (pka "ENGL 102"). We will adopt the new courses beginning in Spring, 2015, and I will make certain that they are entered into the 2014-2016 catalog which we are currently editing. Since we will still be offering ENGL 101 and 102 in Fall, 2014, I will be leaving those courses in the catalog with the expectation that those two courses will be deleted in the 2016-2018 catalog.



As you know from the announcement at the February Faculty Assembly, it is with some degree of regret that I will be leaving the Valencia Campus at the end of June to assume the position of Provost at the University of Rio Grande (a private comprehensive residential and commuter university, founded 1876) and Rio Grande Community College (a public

community college, founded 1974, in facilities on the Rio Grande Main Campus and with Centers in Meigs County and in Vinton County) in southeastern Ohio. I have been told that my new email will be rsax@rio.edu, so please note that in case you have questions or need a recommendation letter or anything else from me after midsummer. It has been an honor and a pleasure to serve this community for the last three years, and I hope and expect to maintain many of the professional and personal relationships that have developed since my relocation to New Mexico, always maintaining a fond place in my heart for this branch campus in the Rio Abajo.

But it looks like "Rye-ooh," dude, as in ham on rye.

NMHEAR Conference: UNM Main Campus Chemistry Talks

Location: Albuquerque, NM **When:** February 27 and 28

It was great to hear several presentations by the Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry faculty from UNM main campus. They have recently redesigned the General Chemistry series, Chem 121 and Chem 122, to incorporate more active learning components into the classroom. The faculty presented comparisons between the redesigned and traditional courses including course grades/pass rates and concept inventory scores. The results were mixed with very little difference in the pass rates, but significant increases in scores on the concept inventory for students in the redesigned courses. The main campus faculty shared many of their classroom activities. This will greatly facilitate incorporation of active learning modules into the chemistry courses here at UNM-Valencia. We were able to discuss opportunities to better align main campus and UNM-Valencia chemistry courses during NMHEAR and have scheduled a follow up meeting with main campus and other branch campus faculty in April.

NMHEAR Conference

Location: Albuquerque, NM **When:** Febru ary 27 and 28

The most important session I attended at NMHEAR was "Stretch and Studio in First Year Composition: Models for Addressing Retention" presented by Cristyn Elder, Bethany Davila, and Charles Paine from Main Campus. They did the same presentation at 4Cs, where it was called "Access for America's Emerging Demographic: A Model for Reducing Remediation and Addressing Linguistic Diversity in a Minority-Majority FYC Program." That second title

says a great deal more about what they are on about; essentially, it was a description of the pilot Main Campus is doing that is parallel to our Accelerated Learning Program (ALP) pilot. Main campus isn't using the term "ALP" or basing it as directly on the Baltimore model as we are, but it's ultimately the same animal. Interestingly, while we were waiting for our plane in the Indy airport after 4Cs, Chuck Paine said he thought each campus must contextualize and adapt these models for those campus's individual needs--and he had also heard of what we here at UNM-Valencia's Developmental English program are doing with pre-college ALP (099/100) and integrated reading/writing by means of a presentation Carolyn Calhoon-Dillahunt from Yakima Community College made about how they've adapted "our" model. I guess this stuff gets around.

The most important thing I heard at Cris, Beth, and Chuck's NMHEAR session--aside from simply finding out how Main Campus is structuring and preparing teachers for their studio and stretch college-level writing courses--was about translingual students. They are explicitly emphasizing in professional development and in their curriculum that when students come to our classes with more than one language, it is far more reasonable, productive, and humane to view them as having language assets rather than deficits. They are still working on including in their professional development what that means for practical classroom practice and for helping students code-shift into academic English, and I plan on finding out what they figure out so I can bring it to our campus.

Highway to Success

Highway to Success math instructor Sarah Garde attended the Texas Instruments (TI) Teachers Teaching with Technology (T^3) International Conference March 7-9 in Las Vegas, along with several other thousand middle grade through university level math and science instructors. Sessions were both hands-on and demonstrative in nature. Key ideas reinforced during the sessions regarding technology:

- Its use supports student learning and retention for all learners via highly engaging activities.
- It helps students discuss with a purpose.
- The TI-Nspire for iPad software allows modeling with photos taken both on the spot and also stored in files.
- Understanding difficult concepts comes alive through interactive touch on the iPad.
- It can be used for both formative and summative assessments.

• One can use the iPad to send/collect/grade work and give timely and meaningful feedback to students.

Many resources were shared during the conference, including various websites with free lesson plans and pre-made documents for math and science activities. Sarah will be incorporating the iPad and TI-Inspire app in her classes with the help of IT support from Najib and George. Thank you Najib for sponsoring and supporting this technology training!

The NMHEAR Conference was attended by Sarah Garde, Rosa Auletta and Patricia Gillikin. Information presented by the English and Math Departments at Main Campus was very helpful as we analyze our pilots in both disciplines at Valencia. Both programs are working to compress developmental classes into college level courses which count towards a degree.

Things ${\mathfrak S}$ Learned at the Conference on College Composition and Communication (4Cs) in Indianapolis, Indiana

The story so far: The last time you read about UNM-Valencia's Developmental English Program, Xena and Gabrielle and the ancient Greek god of war had just left the premises to fight it out on the mesa (see last month's newsletter for details and outcome). Not too much has happened since: we've been teaching, and we've organized and given in class midterm writings, which we are now assessing. The usual.

Amiee Stahlman and I have, however, attended and presented at 4Cs, and I write this now from our hotel room in Indianapolis, since the newsletter deadline is tomorrow. We were invited by the Teaching English in the Two-Year College (TYCA) folks to present at the TYCA all-day pre-conference workshop, and it was a blast, and by all reports well-received. I invited participants to do an activity very much like what we ask our own writers to do, in a session called "Integrating Reading Pedagogy into Our Basic Writing Curriculum," and I shared a variety of methods our program uses to integrate reading with writing. At one point in my session, as we annotated and discussed Sheridan Blau's description of the dimensions of performative literacy, and in particular his idea that effective readers must be able to be irreverent with texts—questioning them, not simply mindlessly agreeing to a teacher's pat interpretation—I asked everybody, "How can we be more irreverent in our teaching?"—meaning also, how can we foster that beneficial irreverence in our students?

Amiee's response was, "I'm always irreverent in the classroom." My question has stayed with me, and I've been searching the conference for answers.

After I presented, Amiee then discussed her strategies for teaching in accelerated classes—or as she prefers, compressed classes—in a talk entitled "Accelerating Without Missing the Turns." She shared how we begin with Nietzsche, how genre theory and discourse

communities and discussions of power and language inform her teaching, and how several of us work with packets, asking students to take responsibility for studying and sharing readings they choose from a variety of texts in areas such as gender, race, and class. A few of the participants in the room were well-respected, long-time scholars in the field of Rhetoric and Composition, and I noticed them taking careful notes as Amiee talked.

The most important thing I learned that day was from Cheryl Hogue Smith, who presented before Amiee and I did. Cheryl led us through a beautifully sequenced set of readings and writings from her own classes, and the highlight was how she had elicited from her students the most detailed analysis of why and how they had decided to make revisions to their own drafts. Fostering that kind of metacognition as readers and writers is an ongoing goal of our own program.

That was yesterday. Today, I volunteered at the C's the Day table (a gamification of the conference to encourage deeper engagement and fun) and attended four sessions, one of which, "Precarious Pedagogies: Embodied Performance in the Writing Classroom," amazed me—I laughed, I cried (both quite literally), and I will be implementing next week what I learned there. It was about using theatre in the classroom, and began with an example of Invisible Theatre that had everyone fooled and on edge. Then, we moved chairs to the side of the room, got in a circle—and learned how to embody meaning from texts through performing, and guiding others to perform, scenes from Paolo Freire and Audre Lorde. The whole thing was based in the work of a guy named Augusto Boal, a Brazilian who is a contemporary of Freire, and because we acted out the ideas presented, we are ready now to try the activities out on our students. I then had one of those hour and a half-long conversations with one of the presenters that to me are the most fun things about conferences.

Amiee then found me and we attended a huge publisher's party at a museum, and after we had our fill of astoundingly good food, Peter Adams of Baltimore's Accelerated Learning Program (ALP), who has been key in the spread of ALP across the country, stopped by to chat and tell us how much he had enjoyed our presentations in the TYCA

workshop. He's a sweet person and gladly helped Amiee achieve a quest in the C's the Day game, which means tomorrow she will pick up her sparkle pony prize. Even though it's Thursday and we don't leave this city and the conference until Saturday, we've both gotten a ton out of 4Cs, and if the airport travel digestive system ever spits us back out in Albuquerque, we'd be happy to tell you much more about it all.

After an extensive review process, University Libraries (UL) has purchased a new web-based cataloging and acquisition system that

will be implemented over the next year. The new system, Worldshare, is a product of OCLC. WorldShare is a set of integrated applications built on a cloud-based, software platform. For library users the transition will be largely invisible except that new tools will improve the ease with which students and faculty find and get what they need for their research.

Several phases of the migration process may include some interruption in service. The first of which will be the week of March 31, 2014 through April 7, 2014. During this time, new items cannot be added to or removed from the system.
