Course Outline

<u>Teaching Methods</u>: Psy 105 will use a variety of online approaches to meet the course outcomes. These instructional methods may include, but are not limited to reading the textbook and articles, discussions, examinations, self-evaluation, written assignments, computer and on-line activities, and decision-making exercises.

Attendance: Regular log-in to the UNMLearn is required and will enhance student learning. Students who do not log-in within the first three days of class will be dropped from the class. Students who do not complete 3 consecutive assignments/quizzes will be dropped from the course. Students should not assume they will be dropped from the class automatically. Students must take the initiative in arranging with their instructor to make up missed work.

Students who are dropped by an instructor for non-attendance will be notified at their UNM e-mail address. If the student believes a mistake has been made, he or she must contact the instructor within two working days of receipt of the drop notification.

<u>Due Dates</u>: The due dates for all work will be posted in the corresponding weekly learning module. <u>These</u> <u>deadlines</u> <u>will not be extended and no make-up work will be permitted.</u>

Make Up Work: Is only permitted after the student has communicated with the instructor and provided written documentation of an illness or other emergency.

Learning Modules: Each week students will work within a learning module. The Learning module will contain the reading assignments from the textbook and instructions for the discussion and chapter assignments as well as the deadlines for all work to be submitted. Grading rubrics will also be included when applicable.

Chapter Assignments: Each week students will have one chapter assignments (15 total assignments). Each chapter assignment will be worth 20 points for a possible total of 300 points. Instructions for completion of assignments, submission of assignments, and deadlines for submission of assignments are included in each weekly learning module. (300 points).

Research Paper: You are required to complete one research project. Choose a topic from the topics listed in UNMLearn Research Paper link. You must obtain topic approval by me prior to submitting it. Send me your topic idea, introductory paragraph and list of references to be used by the deadline indicated on the Schedule. Your paper must be in APA style and 3-5 pages, double-spaced (this page count does not include the additional title and reference pages, which are also required). You must use outside sources (other than your text book) such as internet sites, and psychological journal articles. A minimum of 3 outside sources must be used. See schedule for due date. (50 points).

<u>Discussion Board:</u>. Each week students will be asked to post a discussion regarding a compelling topic related to the relevant reading for the week (see chapter learning modules). All students are also required to post two peer responses for each discussion assignment. See Discussion Instructions for more details. Primary posts must be at least 100 words and include an in text citation (acknowledgement of your source) and the source must be listed in APA format at the end of your post as well. Each discussion assignment is worth a total of 10 points. (150 points)

<u>Chapter Quizzes:</u> Each week students will complete a multiple-choice quiz covering the assigned weekly chapter(s). Each quiz will contain 10 questions (2 points each) for a total of 20 points. There will be 15 chapter quizzes administered during the semester. (300 points)

<u>Cumulative Final Exam:</u> The cumulative final exam will be worth 100 points. It will consist of questions from all seven chapters covered in the course. The final exam will be given during the last three days of class. A study guide will be provided to students prior to the exam (100 points)
