COURSE DESCRIPTION - This course is designed for students with little exposure to Spanish. This course develops basic listening, speaking, reading and writing skills and basic intercultural competence in interpretive, interpersonal and presentational modes of communication at the Novice Level of proficiency based on ACTFL guidelines. During this course, students perform better and stronger in the Novice Mid level while some abilities emerge in the Novice High range. This is an introductory course aimed at helping the student to communicate in Spanish in everyday familiar situations via recognition and production of practiced or memorized words, phrases, and simple sentences.

REQUIRED TEXTS Vistas, Sixth Edition.

You can purchase the book directly through the website of the publisher. It will give you two options: A loose leaf book with access to the homework website or just a code that gives you access to the homework website. Access to the homework website gives you access to the ebook (online version of the book), so you do not need to purchase an actual text. DO NOT SEND ALL CAP MESSAGES. All capital letters means you are screaming at the person to whom you are writing. In an online class, this would be considered inappropriate behavior. If you wish to emphasize a point, underline it or put it in bold font.

YOUR PROFESSOR (IN A NUTSHELL)

I was born Douglas Deane but have been called Diego since childhood. I developed a love for Spanish as a teenager in Puerto Rico. This interest continued as a college student with a Major in Foreign Language. The principle concentration for my degree was Spanish with accompanying coursework in German and Hebrew. While working on my undergrad I spent a semester in Tijuana, Mexico during the height of the cartel wars. After graduation I took a job at the US State Department with the office of Cuban Affairs. A few years later I came to New Mexico to pursue an M.A. in Latin American Studies. I graduated with concentrations in Spanish Linguistics, Brazilian Studies, and International Management. Every summer during grad school I would do "research" (jiu-jitsu) in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. More recently I spent a year in Cali, Colombia working as fashion model. I currently split time between Albuquerque and Mexico City to fulfill my teaching and modeling responsibilities.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

STUDENT PRESENCE AND PARTICIPATION: Learning a new language well requires consistent effort. Student activity in the course shell is recorded and allows instructor to know how much time and effort a student has put into class presence. Students enrolled for credit or audit are expected to log-in to the course and actively participate in the course with frequency. You should expect to be in class at least 3-5 hours per week. If your class presence is less than the recommended time for 3 weeks, your instructor may drop you or assign you a grade of 'F'. Failure to log-in during the first week of class could result in the student being dropped.

Participation is 30% of your overall grade. It consists of the following activities/assignments: 3 passport activities, discussion/introduction, el horario and Aurora's email assignments, and the oral project. Directions for all of these are included in the learning modules in UNM Learn and they are also listed in the weekly assignment checklist.

<u>ONLINE HOMEWORK</u>: The online homework is done through an external website. <u>vhlcentral.com</u> This website also gives you access to the online version of the book (ebook) and all of the homework activities. **Therefore, you do not need to buy an actual textbook for this course.** (the directions to set up your account are included below) Every week when you log into this site, you will see a list of the activities and their corresponding due dates. Most of the activities are machine graded, meaning it will be graded instantly. Some activities may require you to listen to a dialogue and answer questions accordingly. At times you may also need to record your answer as part of the activity. So, you will need functioning speakers and a microphone to complete all activities (these are built-in on most computers). <u>You can attempt every activity as many times as you'd like until you achieve your desired score.</u>

QUIZZES and EXAMS: There will be a quiz at the end of each chapter as well as possible short quizzes on specific topics at the instructor's discretion. There are no make-up quizzes. Quizzes total 25% of the final grade. There will be a comprehensive mandatory final exam covering the material in *Lecciones* 1 through 5. The final exam is worth 10% of the total grade.

GRADING PROCEDURE

The final grade will be **a** combination of workbook/laboratory manual (homework), class participation, quizzes and final exam.

Instruction for Students:

If you are new to Vista Higher Learning, complete these steps:

Step 1 - Go to vhlcentral.com

Step 2 - Create an Account

- 1. Create an account by clicking Create an Account.
- 2. In the "Login Information" section of the account creation page, enter a username of your choice.
- 3. Enter the email address you would like to associate with your account.
- 4. Enter and confirm a password of your choice.
- 5. In the "Personal Profile" section, enter your first and last name as you wish them to appear in your Instructor's roster.
- 6. Select the year of your birth from the drop down list.
- 7. In the "Security Information" section, provide the answer to a secret question, which may later be used to help you access your account if you forget your password.

8. Click "continue" to review your information for accuracy, then select "create account." (Before your account is created, you must agree to the terms and conditions of use policy.)

Step 3 - Select a School

- 1. Locate your school by typing your school's name. To narrow the search results, add the city and state, (include the country, if outside of the USA) in which your school is located.
- 2. Hit enter or click the magnifying glass. If the terms you entered did not result in a successful search, follow the on-screen tips to revise your search.
- 3. Select your school from the list by clicking on its name.
- 4. Click Select to add the school to your account.
- 5. Look for a message at the top of the screen confirming you successfully added the school.

Step 4 - Select a Course/Class

- 1. From the list of available classes at your school for your textbook, look for your instructor's name and the name of your instructor's course and section.
- 2. Click Enroll. You should see a confirmation that you successfully enrolled in your instructor's course and section.
