Welcome to English 1120 Composition II. I look forward to working with you this semester as we learn how to use the English language with research and writing to develop arguments and seek deeper understanding of topics that you choose to write about. You will become a writer and a thinker.

Course Description: "In this course, students will explore argument in multiple genres. Research and writing practices emphasize summary, analysis, evaluation, and integration of secondary sources. Students will analyze rhetorical situations in terms of audience, contexts, purpose, mediums, and technologies and apply this knowledge to their reading, writing, and research. Students will sharpen their understanding of how writing and other modes of communication work together for rhetorical purposes. The emphasis of this course will be on research methods."

- The assignment syllabus is a tentative schedule, any changes will be announced and or posted on the Blackboard Learn calendar.
- All weekly assignments are due at Sunday at 10pm.
- Late work is not accepted unless you have a documented emergency. Essays are not an exception.

- We do not have a textbook; you will be required to access online open-sourced texts.

3. Use a variety of research methods to gather appropriate, credible information.

4. Evaluate sources, claims, and evidence for their relevance, credibility, and purpose.

5. Quote, paraphrase, and summarize sources ethically, citing and documenting them appropriately.

6. Integrate information from sources to effectively support claims as well as other purposes (to provide background information, evidence/examples, illustrate an alternative view, etc.).

7. Use an appropriate voice (including syntax and word choice).

Navigating this Online Course:

Because This class is administered online, it is important to have a high level of skill and operating computers. It is not recommended for students with limited computer skills to take an online course. 1. Log on! Lessons open on Monday morning and close the following Sunday night at 10pm. On Monday, log in and read the list of assignments for the week.

Make sure you have all materials you need to complete the assignment such as page numbers or links down due dates and print out assignments.

2. Read the assignment actively highlighting important ideas, use any resources dictionaries asking questions etc. To help you acquire the information the session is trying to relay. Be proactive and disciplined in your study habits.

3. Log on periodically throughout the week to check course emails and review new threaded discussions or blog responses. Watch for new announcements from your professor.

4. Check discussions, read questions I have posted for the week and your classmates and my responses and enter your own answers. Your responses are an important part of your completion so please take these exercises seriously. In responses, respect others finally read spelling grammar check on your postings.

5. Importantly give yourself ample time to submit work while before the deadline. You can submit work right at 10pm but this practice is very very risky. For example, computer failures corrupted disk Blackboard Learn outages are no excuse for work not completed (UNM-VC policy). Plan for problems like these because meeting deadlines will help you successfully complete the course.

UNM Administrative Mandate on Required Vaccinations

UNM Requirement on Masking in Indoor Spaces

All students, staff, and instructors are required to wear face masks in indoor classes, labs, studios and meetings on UNM campuses, see <u>masking requirement</u>. Vaccinated and unvaccinated instructors teaching in classrooms must wear a mask when entering and leaving the classroom and when moving around the room. Except for the limited cases described above, students and employees who do not wear a mask in classrooms and other indoor public spaces on UNM campuses are subject to disciplinary actions.

<u>Communication on change in modality</u>: The university may direct that classes move to remote delivery at any time to preserve the health and safety of the students, instructor and community. <u>Acceptable masks and mask wearing in class</u>: A two-layer mask that covers the nose and mouth and that is cleaned regularly is acceptable, as are disposable medical masks, KN95, KF94, FFP1 and FFP2 masks. A face shield is not sufficient protection. It is vital that you wear your mask correctly, covering your nose and mouth. Removing your mask for an extended period to eat or drink in class violates the university mask requirement and endangers others.

<u>Consequences of not wearing a mask properly</u>: If you don't wear a mask, or if you do not wear a mask properly by covering your nose and mouth, you will be asked to leave class. If you fail to wear a mask properly on more than one occasion, you can expect to be dropped from the class. If you insist on remaining in the classroom while not wearing a mask, class will be dismissed for the day to protect others and you will be dropped from the class immediately.

The instructor will try to have a few disposable masks available in the classroom on a first-come, first-served basis.

<u>Citizenship and/or Immigration Status</u>: All students are welcome in this class regardless of citizenship, residency, or immigration status. Your professor will respect your privacy if you choose to disclose your status. Library Literacy

- Students will access Libros and find a book relevant to the writing project.
- Students will learn how to skim a text or document and find quotations that are both relevant and appropriate for the paper.
- Students will be able to identify what type of database source they have found, e.g. magazine, journal, newspaper or website.
- Students will write a correctly formatted Works Cited page.

- Emails should include a salutation: "Dear Professor Macaron", as an example.
- Please close with an appropriate phrase and sign your email with your name. Some examples of appropriate phrases are "Sincerely", "Best", "Thank you".
- Use short paragraphs (in general 3-4 sentences is a paragraph).
- Be sure to proofread for grammar errors and spelling.

Essays:

You are required to turn in 2 formal 3-4 page essays (not including the Works Cited page). These essays are assigned by me and written specifically for this class: a Rhetorical Analysis essay and an Evaluation essay. Each essay requires at least one **credible** source to be incorporated in text and in the Works Cited page (**Wikipedia does not count**). Students may be dropped from the class for failure to turn in one of the major essays. I will provide instructions for each assignment at the beginning of each new unit. Rough drafts must have significant changes/revisions or they will not pass.

Late Policy:

I will not accept late work unless there is a documented emergency.

Grammar Quizzes:

Open-book optional but encouraged grammar quizzes will be posted on Blackboard. You can complete these for extra credit.

Blackboard Learn

Students are responsible for posting responses to discussion questions/prompts that I have posted on our UNM Blackboard Learn site. These questions are designed to generate class discussion, promote further inquiry into our topics, and scaffold the higher stakes essays. Learn posts are due before we meet as a class on the assigned due date; students may not turn in late posts.

Writing Workshops and Peer Reviews

Built into our schedule are writing workshops intended to give you a jumpstart on your essays, as well as help you get used to constructively evaluating your peers' work through brainstorming, questioning, group discussions, and other class exercises. To receive credit for a workshop, students must be present, actively participating, and producing work.

Participation

Participation is mandatory in this course. Participation means actively participating in your education; just sitting in your seat and allowing everything to sink in (the "osmotic method") is not actively participating. I urge you to take notes in class, ask questions, and participate in class

and group discussions. In addition, I ask you to complete drafts, assignments, quizzes, readings, and collaborative projects.

<u>Portfolio</u>

The portfolio is a collection of your work. The best portfolio effectively showcase a student's ability to research, write, and revise. Portfolios will be evaluated using the learning outcomes.

Student Privacy

Student privacy is strongly protected by professors at UNM-Valencia.
