We will annotate our syllabus by: Asking clarifying questions; sharing opinions about readings and assignments; noting confusions and uncertainties; responding to policies; providing advice; and reflecting on what works and what can change. While your annotation may be critical, let us strive for commentary that is inquisitive and constructive. Course Description

This survey course explores the art and architecture of ancient prehistoric cultures through the end of the fourteenth century. While focused primarily on the art of "Western" civilizations, this course will also provide insights into the works of other cultures in order to develop more fully rounded views of art and history. Emphasis will be placed on the relationship of artworks to political, social, spiritual, intellectual, and cultural movements that affect and are affected by their creation and development. Weekly slideshow lectures will introduce students to works of art and weekly readings will help students learn about the context surrounding the artworks. This challenging and exciting course is designed for anyone who has an interest in art and it is extremely beneficial to those who are pursuing a degree in Fine Arts or a related field.

The following courses, ARTH1120, ARTH2110, ARTH2120 are strongly recommended to all students in the study of art history and related studio areas.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Identify major artworks from a variety of regions and time periods.
- 2. Investigate the methods of producing various works of art.
- 3. Articulate an understanding and appreciation for the political, social, spiritual, intellectual, and cultural contexts of art forms.
- 4. Comprehend and apply terms, methodologies, and concepts common to studies of art history, developing a language to further understand and discuss art.

5. Compare works across a range of historical styles and periods.

Student Responsibilities

- Students are required to attend every class on time, participate in discussions, complete assigned work, and maintain a safe, respectable, and positive class environment.
- More than three absences without prior consultation may result in a failing grade or a drop from the class. Leaving excessively early or arriving late (beyond 15 minutes) three times results in one absence.
- ❖ Cell phones need to be put on mute during class times and kept out of sight. If you must receive a call during class time leave the classroom before you answer. No phone conversations, text messaging, web surfing, movie watching etc. in the classroom. Such actions can disrupt the learning process of other students and is grounds for being dropped from the course. Failure to adhere to this policy will cause a deduction in participation points, or, in severe cases, withdrawal from the class.

My Commitments

- The classroom should be a place of excitement, curiosity, and joy. I will do my best to keep boredom to a minimum.
- You have chosen to be here, therefore, I serve you and your learning. As your instructor, I will trust and respect you.
- My role is not to convince you of my opinions, but to help you form your own. Art is subjective! I will do my best to never speak over you or make you feel like I do not value your opinions.
- ❖ If following your interest in a project or assignment brings your work outside of the parameters of that assignment, your passions come before my guidelines. I will do my best to support your explorations and not penalize you for being creative.
- I will never ask you to compete against one another. There is no limit to how many As or Bs will be given, and differences of opinions are encouraged (as long as we respect and support each other).
- While it is important for you to learn the vocabulary of art and art making, I will never penalize the use of common language or references to popular culture. Art is made in the world, not above it.
- I will never force anyone to participate in ways that make them uncomfortable. I will do my best to make space and time for everyone to contribute in whatever way they need.
- I will never judge or criticize you for ways that you differ from me, whether that be race, gender, sexuality, religion, nationality, class, politics, or culture. I will do my best to not only respect, but encourage you to explore, share, and express any differences in your life.
- ❖ I am always learning and trying to be a better teacher. If you ever want to share with me any ways that I could make this learning experience better for you, I will greet that with gratitude!

Required Course Material

Exams

Exams will be given in class at set dates throughout the semester. Exams are based on class lectures, discussions, and REVEL assignments. The format of each exam will differ and will be discussed with students in advance. See class schedule below for details on which chapters will be covered on each exam and the dates of the exams.

Make Up Exams

Exam dates are noted in the course schedule below. It is extremely important not to miss an exam day. There are no make-up exams for the course per se, however, during finals week,

students will be allowed to take an alternate exam to replace their lowest test score. This exam is generally harder than the other three exams, therefore, it will not be in the student's favor to purposefully miss one of the earlier exams.

REVEL assignments (reading and quizzes)

Log into REVEL frequently and check the assignment calendar to ensure you are keeping up with the assignments. You are required to complete all REVEL assignments before the due date. Late submissions will not be accepted, so plan accordingly.

5 Tips for Using REVEL to Succeed in This Course

- 1. Assignments are made available to students three weeks in advance. Work ahead of due dates to stay on top of your REVEL coursework.
- 2. Track your performance in REVEL throughout the semester.
- 3. Highlighting important sections in the chapter will allow you to easily refer to them later on in the semester. Be on the lookout for any BLUE highlights, as these are highlights or notes coming from me, your instructor!
- 4. You may want to try listening to the audio while you read.
- 5. If you forget your login information, go to the <u>Forgot Username or Password</u> link to retrieve your username or reset your password. Then, enter your email address and click continue. Check your email account for an email with the subject, "Pearson Username/Password Request." The message will contain all of the usernames that are found for that email address. Choose one account to use with REVEL.

Attendance

Attendance is required. Your attendance/participation score is calculated by the number of times you attend class, divided by total class meetings. It is your responsibility to make sure you are signed in for attendance. If you leave class early or arrive to class late, it will be reflected in your attendance score. Students with excessive absences (more than 3 absences) will be dropped from the course. If you are not in class by the start time as designated on this syllabus, you are late. Three tardies equals one unexcused absence. Excused absences will require a doctor's note. Students are required to bring in a copy of the doctor's note to the instructor within a week's time of the absence.

Late Work

In general I do not accept late work. All of the due dates for Revel assignments are listed clearly Revel so make sure you keep track of due dates. Assignments in Revel are available to students two weeks before they are due. My advice to students is to work ahead in Revel as much as possible. If you have extenuating circumstances such as a death in the family, severe sickness, or a major accident, extensions may be granted. It is the student's responsibility to notify the instructor as soon as possible when an extension is needed.

Extra Credit

Five extra credit points will be added to an exam score when you visit a gallery, museum or attend an art lecture and complete a reflection paper. Gift/tourist shops not included. You must show me a receipt or exhibition card and type a full page reflection (double-spaced, 12pt font) about your visual experience. Be sure to use references/terminology and critical thinking based on what we have studied in class. No submissions by email will be accepted. A maximum of 10 extra credit points will be allowed for the semester.

Student Behavior

Neither dishonesty nor unruly behavior will be tolerated in the classroom; such actions will lead to being dropped from the course. Individuals who received their second dose of a Pfizer or Moderna vaccine after June 15, 2021 or who received their single dose of Johnson & Johnson after November 15, 2021 must provide documentation of receipt of a booster within four weeks of eligibility, according to the criteria provided by the FDA (6 months after completing an initial two-dose Moderna vaccine, 5 months after completing the Pfizer sequence, and 2 months after receiving a one-dose Johnson and Johnson vaccine).

Exemptions: Individuals who cannot yet obtain a booster due to illness should request a medical, religious, or online remote exemption (which may have an end date) and upload this to the vaccination verification site.

Medical and religious exemptions validated in Fall 2021 (see your email confirmation) are also valid for Spring 2022 unless an end date was specified in the granting of a limited medical exemption. Students must apply for a remote online exemption every semester.

COVID-19 Symptoms and Positive Test Results:

Please do not come to a UNM campus if you are experiencing symptoms of illness, or have received a positive COVID-19 test (even if you have no symptoms)!
