# **GAME 250: Character & Creature Modeling**

#### **Course Goals:**

Use our knowledge of animation and modeling to create detailed 3D characters. Students will learn and follow a full character workflow, ending with adding fully animated characters to Unreal Engine.

# **Learning Objectives:**

By the end of the course, students will:

- 1. Use anatomy, proportions, and shape to design appealing characters
- 2. Be able to model characters using professional workflows
- 3. Understand topology and avoid common issues with 3D models
- 4. Make clothes and hair for 3D models using physics simulations
- 5. Be able to import rigs and animations into Unreal Engine

## Materials:

You *must* have:

- Internet Access, for Learn, Zoom, and Youtube
- Unreal Engine 4.26 or higher (https://www.unrealengine.com/en-US/)
- Blender 3.0 or higher (<a href="https://www.blender.org/">https://www.blender.org/</a>)
- Notebook / Sketchbook

# **Course Content**

This course is broken down into four units, ranging from 3 to 5 weeks each. Each unit will have small assignments and tutorials that build towards a final goal, such as uploading a fully rigged model. In addition, students are expected to post weekly updates showing their work and respectfully peer reviewing each other's work.

# **Project Schedule**

# Weeks 1 - 5: Character Design & Basic Modeling

- Learn the theory of proportions and shapes in character design
- Analyze the shapes, structure, and proportions of existing video game characters
- Use a low-poly "chibi" style and retro textures to guickly practice character workflow
- Rig and animate our model before importing them to Unreal Engine

#### Weeks 6 - 8: Realistic Base Mesh

- Model a human base using simple techniques
- Emphasis on realistic proportions
- Tricks for dealing with common issues like flipped normals or excess vertices
- How to maintain good topology?

## Weeks 9 - 12: Detail Sculpting

- Adding separate body features such as eyes and teeth
- Using sculpting techniques to make detailed facial features
- Focusing on subtle details that add realism
- Techniques for designing and modeling clothes

## Weeks 13 - 16: Unreal Rig

- Importing skeletal rigs, meshes, and animations
- Making character actions reactive and dynamic
- Building a full animation system for a character in UE4

## **Grade Breakdown:**

As much of the semester is working through a single character, grades will be mainly based on effort, progress, and completion. Students are expected to do detailed and thorough work.

Weekly Updates 40% (2.5% per week)

Unit Progress 40% (8% for finishing each unit on time and to standards)

Peer Review 20%

Letter grades will be given as follows, with + or - given for the highest and lowest 3% in each range, respectively. Incomplete (I) grades will not be assigned without extenuating circumstances

## **Assignments:**

Assignments will be given on UNM Canvas (<a href="https://canvas.unm.edu/">https://canvas.unm.edu/</a>) Homework assignments will typically be due either in one class session or a week after being assigned. Larger assignments and projects will be broken up into smaller pieces (such as drafts or rough versions) each with their own due dates, and the whole project given at least two weeks in advance.

#### Late Work / Absences:

Unexcused late work may be docked points at my discretion, especially collaborative work that puts more of a burden on fellow students. Any assignments not submitted by the end of the semester (12/17) will be graded 0.
