Course Description: This course follows the American Heart Association requirements to prepare the student with knowledge, skill, and techniques necessary to recognize and provide care in first aid, respiratory, and cardiac emergencies, using the latest CPR and emergency cardiac care guidelines. Students learn how to perform rescue breathing, one and two-rescuer CPR, how to use airway adjuncts (bag-valve-mask), and how to operate an Automated External Defibrillator (AED).

Course Objectives and Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Demonstrate the proper procedures to follow in an emergency situation.
- 2. Demonstrate awareness of scene safety for yourself and others
- 3. Recognize the scope of practice of volunteers and professionals trained in Professional Rescuer First Aid and CPR.
- 4. Identify the legal considerations of providing care.
- 5. Assess victims of different conditions and apply appropriate treatments based off of standards and their knowledge and understanding of human anatomy and physiology.
- 6. Apply appropriate intervention techniques while reducing the risk of disease transmission.
- 7. Perform one and two-person CPR with infants, children, and adults.
- 8. Use airway adjuncts (bag-valve-mask and oxygen administration).
- 9. Demonstrate appropriate competency with AED operation and use.
- 10. Develop an appreciation for the importance of proper Professional Rescuer First Aid and CPR skills/procedures in order to save lives and prevent and treat injuries.
- 11. Demonstrate these skills up to the level of the AHA's standards.

Course Requirements: Class participation, chapter tests, and comprehensive final exam. Class participation includes in-class activities and assignments. These activities and assignments must be completed to receive a grade of passing for written work. The correct spelling of medical terminology is considered in the correctness of written assignments, tests/exams. Students will

be dropped from the course for the following reasons:

- 1. Activities will consist of homework assignments and quizzes designed to focus learning and prepare students for the examinations. Students may utilize any resources (the text, the instructor, other students, online resources, library, medical library, etc.) they find helpful to complete these assignments. Students must refrain from simply copying another's work or answers!! If this occurs, the student will be dropped from the class. Be aware that there are many resources that do not completely or accurately explain human anatomy and physiology—one of your goals as a student is to develop the skills necessary to identify and use reputable and accurate reference materials. The assignments may take the form of quizzes, problems assigned from the text or instructor, and/or short collegiate essays (APA or MLA Format).
- 2. **All reading assignments** must be completed before class. Regular class attendance and participation in class discussions are expected.
- 3. **Quizzes/Exams** will be given at the discretion of the instructor.
- 4. You will NOT be able to make up missed exams unless you can provide written proof, from a physician or nurse, of an illness or emergency.
- 5. **Participation**: In-class assignments will consist of role-playing and scenario decision-making problems, group activities, and other related work. You are expected to fully participate in all activities in order to succeed in this class.
- 6. Electronic Devices, of any kind, MUST BE OFF AND PUT AWAY DURING CLASS TIME unless specified by instructor.
- 7. Late assignments will be penalized one full grade.
- 8. Attendance for Final Exams is mandatory. If missed it cannot be made up.
- 9. **Exams** will cover the assigned reading assignments, lectures/labs content and UNM learning materials.
