Course Description	This course introduces students in Health Education to basic principles and terms, theories, models, ethical issues, health education journals, agencies, associations, the competencies to become a Certified Health Education Specialist (CHES) and related foundations to enhance the health status of individuals and communities.
Student Learning Objectives	 Students will: Describe basic principles and terms of the profession of health education; Describe the current status of health education and explain why it is important for health education professionals to understand the history of health, health education, and health care; Identify five predominant philosophies, theories and models of health education; Describe the five ethical issues currently facing the profession of health education; Describe the five ethical issues currently facing the profession of health education and outline a guide for making ethical decisions; Describe the difference between a primary, a secondary, and tertiary, and a popular press source; Identify ways, such as networking, health educators can stay up-to-date in the field and become familiar with various journals, health agencies, associations and organizations with which the profession of health education interacts; Identify the competencies needed for the Certified Health Education Specialist (CHES) in each of the four major practice setting;
