COURSE DESCRIPTION: Introduction to Art is a REVEL enhanced beginning course that serves to increase the understanding and appreciation of the visual arts across a broad range of media, periods, and cultures from the ancient world to the present. The formal elements, technical processes, and historical development of the visual arts are covered, along with an emphasis on the development of a critical eye. Textbook readings, lectures, discussions, quizzes, writing assignments, and other activities will assist students in gaining a critical understanding of the history of art. ARTH 101 meets New Mexico Lower-Division General Education Common Core Curriculum Area V: Humanities and Fine Arts (NMCCN 1013). The following courses, ARTH 101, ARTH 201, ARTH 202, are strongly recommended to all students in the study of art history and related studio areas.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Through readings, slide lectures and assignments the student will be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of terminology, styles, iconography, formal elements and principles of art and design
- Discuss art in a historical and cultural context
- Recognize and describe materials and technical processes commonly involved in the production of a work of art
- Evaluate art using criticism and critical thinking in a variety of ways such as writing, visual, and oral communication
- Formulate a personal aesthetic that can be applied to everyday life
- Enjoy and appreciate art

TEXTBOOKS: A World of Art, 8th Edition by Henry M. Sayre

NOTE: You are required to purchase the REVEL version of Sayre, A World of Art, 8e for this course. I will assign readings and reading quizzes in REVEL - they are worth 30% of your grade.

At the UNM-Valencia Bookstore, you have 2 purchasing options:

- 1. You can purchase only the access card
- 2. You can purchase the access card and "loose leaf" text as a package





The text is not bound. If you purchase the text AND access card, you will need a binder for the text. It has been hole punched already.

The access card IS required, the printed text is not. Do not only buy the text for this course or you will not have access to the required REVEL online content. **It is required!**

METHODS OF INSTRUCTION:

Instruction includes textbook readings, lecture, class discussions, REVEL assignments, and other activities. Refer to the course schedule to know what the due dates are for each of these items.

- Each week students will be required to read certain chapters and/or pages of the required textbook, take reading quizzes, watch movies, and perform other homework activities.



EXPECTATIONS:

Students are expected to:

- Attend all class sessions, excellent attendance is essential to success
- Be in class on time and prepare for each class meeting
- Take notes
- Complete the required readings for each class within the specified due dates. The required readings, however, are only supplemental to in-class lectures. **Lectures and class discussion are the most integral components to learning the material for this class.**
- Participate in class discussions
- Complete in-class quick response writing exercises and quizzes
- Complete one gallery/museum visit assignment, one visual analysis essay, in-class midterm, and the final exam.

ATTENDANCE: Attendance is mandatory!

Students are required to attend **ALL** regularly scheduled class sessions. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of the class, for every class session.

- **Absence Policy:** Excessive absences may result in either a failing grade or being dropped from the class by the instructor. In this class, "excessive absences" are defined as missing more than two class sessions. Since this is an eight-week course, one class session being missed is equivalent to two unexcused absences in a full-term course. Therefore, missing two class sessions is equivalent to four unexcused absences and will result in the student being dropped from this class.
- **Medical or personal problems** will be excused with professional documentation only. This means a statement from a medical professional declaring that you have been ill enough to miss class.
- **Tardies**: three tardies (being 10 or more minutes late) will equal one unexcused absence. Missing more than 30 minutes of a class at the beginning or at the end will both be considered an absence. If you have trouble attending class, please discuss your attendance problems privately with me after class.
- All missed activities and work will need to be made-up outside the regular class. You are responsible for the information missed. Make an appointment to see me for missed lectures.
- All in-class assignments are ineligible for make-up credit if missed due to an unexcused absence.

-Withdrawal

After two absences in a row, the instructor will withdraw the student. The instructor may withdraw the student or suggest to the student that he or she withdraw for the following reasons:

- -If the student falls far behind in the exercises, for any reason
- -If there is an extreme language barrier between student and instructor
