Catalog Description

In this course, students will read representative world masterpieces from the 1600s to the present. Students will broaden their understanding of literature and their knowledge of other cultures through exploration of how literature represents individuals, ideas, and customs of world cultures. The course focuses strongly on examining the ways literature and culture intersect and define each other.

Credit Hour Statement

This is a three-credit-hour course delivered in an entirely online modality over 16 weeks during the Spring 2024 semester: January 15th -May 11th. Please plan for a *minimum* of 6 hours per week to learn course materials and complete assignments. The amount of reading we'll do each week varies between 15 to 100 pages depending on the author, style, and form of a work. Therefore, it is highly recommended that students practice time management skills by tackling a bit of course work daily rather than leaving things until the last minute.

Course Objectives

Throughout the semester, students will:

- Analyze distinctive literary forms and themes from literature around the world from early modernity to the present.
- Defend their ideas and interpretations concerning works, authors, and literary periods.
- Identify cultural periods or movements from the 16th century to the 21st century, their significant dates, and the political and historical forces that inspired them, the representative authors, and their literary works.
- Interpret literary works within their social, historical, and cultural contexts.
- Make connections between literary works across cultures, regions, and time periods.

Course Content and Assignments

Course Content, Or the Eras Tour (ENGL 2660's Version)

The course content is divided into 6 units, each centered around a significant historical era of literature from early modernity (16th century) to contemporary times (21st century). The class will read from many genres including autobiography, drama, epistolary, novella, poetry, short fiction, and works that obscure the boundaries of literary genres and forms. Students will explore how writers of each historical era utilize literature to grapple with sweeping cultural, social, and political changes whose effects can be felt across the globe.

<u>Literary Analysis Projects (30%)</u>

Students will **submit 2 literary analyses projects – one in Week 8 and another during Finals Week**. Each literary project is worth 150 points. In addition, each literary project is broken down into mini assignments that comprise steps leading up to a final draft. For each literary analysis project students will:

- 1. Sign up for a text(s)to analyze.
- 2. Conduct a Close Reading and Reflection of the assigned text(s) in order to generate ideas for the literary analysis.
- 3. Submit a first draft of the literary analysis to the instructor for feedback.
- 4. Submit a final draft of the literary analysis.

The final draft of a Literary Analysis Project is 100 points and the mini assignments for each project total 50 points, for a total of 150 points per project. Students are required to format their projects according to MLA standards and to include MLA-style citations.

Pro-Tip for Student

Success: To ensure a healthy work/life balance, consider adapting one or more of these timemanagement strategies:

- Schedule time for schoolwork and other priorities. Keep track of your schedule on a calendar or planner.
- Prioritize major projects and start working on them at least two weeks before they are due.
- 3. Work in 45 minutes to 1-hour chunks; then take a break to avoid burn-out.
- 4. Show yourself compassion if you fall behind (it happens!) and make a plan to get back on track.

Discussions (20%)

There will be a discussion every week where students will engage with the week's literary works. Initial posts will be due on Fridays by 11:59 PM and 2 required peer responses will be due on Mondays by 11:59 PM. Each discussion is worth 20 points (10 for writing the post and 10 for responding to peers).

Unit Quizzes (20%)

At the end of each unit, students will take a quiz on Canvas that ensures they read and understood the unit's materials and prepares them for the midterm exam and the final exam. Students will have 3 attempts at each quiz and the highest score will count towards a student's final grade. There is no time limit for the quizzes and all quizzes are open book/open notes. There is a total of 6 unit quizzes and each quiz is worth 20 points. Unit quizzes are due by 11:59 PM on Mondays (the final day of a module).

Midterm Exam and Final Exam (20%)

Students will take a midterm exam that covers Units 1-3 (Weeks 1-7) of course content and a final exam that covers Units 4-6 (Weeks 8-16). The midterm and final are 100 points each and comprise 10% each of a student's total grade. Both exams are open book/open notes. Students will have 1 attempt and 2 hours to take each exam. The midterm exam is due Friday, March 8 by 11:59 PM (week 8) and the final exam is due Friday, May 10 by 11:59 PM (finals week).

Orientation Assignments (10%)

During the first week, students will complete 3 assignments to orient students to the course. Together, these three assignments are 10% of a student's overall grade.

Syllabus Quiz

Students take a syllabus quiz during the first week of the course to ensure that you understand class expectations and policies. There are unlimited attempts. The quiz is worth 10 points.

Community Agreements for Professional Netiquette

As covered earlier, the class will create community agreements to uphold during interactions. Students will post their agreements on a padlet and the instructor will add them to the Resources Module. The assignment is worth 10 points.

Introductions Discussion Board

Students will introduce themselves to their instructor and classmates in an introductory discussion board. The initial post and replies to two peers are worth a total of 10 points.
