#### COURSE DESCRIPTION

SPAN 1110 is the first part of a college level introduction to Spanish that promotes language learning in a cultural context. This course is designed for students with little or no exposure to Spanish. This course develops basic listening, speaking, reading and writing skills and basic intercultural competence in interpretive, interpersonal and presentational modes of communication at the Novice Level of proficiency based on ACTFL guidelines. During this course, students perform better and stronger in the Novice Mid-level while some abilities emerge in the Novice High range. SPAN 1110 is an introductory course aimed at helping the student to communicate in Spanish in everyday familiar situations via recognition and production of practiced or memorized words, phrases, and simple sentences.

#### TECHNOLOGY SKILLS AND REQUIREMENTS

If you are computer and Internet savvy, this class is for you, because it has been designed for students that comfortable with technology. Learning is via various modes such as videos, audio, visual presentations, navigating the web, etc., as various websites are regularly accessed to complete the course. The class may be challenging for those students that are not comfortable with multimodal online

instruction. Please become familiar with all the tools required to complete your assignments. And, please know that help is always available through campus technology, website assistance (check the HELP links at each website), or ask the instructor.

### **REQUIRED TEXTS, MATERIALS, and ONLINE ACCOUNTS**

### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS, COMPONENTS, ATTENDANCE & POLICIES**

**Attendance and Participation:** Learning a new language well requires consistent effort. Regular and effective attendance is expected, and attendance and participation are determined by your involvement and engagement with the weekly assignments in the online classroom. Please respect and submit all assignments on CANVAS by the due dates posted.

Any student that is dropped for nonattendance is notified at their UNM e-mail address. If there is a compelling and verifiable reason for not completing assignments and attending regularly, please contact the instructor before you are dropped, or in any event within two days of email notification.

**DISCUSSIONS:** On Discussions on CANVAS are where you will be able to post along with your classmates. Assignment topics are posted and you are expected to post and to reply at least once per Module.

**CANVAS ONLINE:** Assignments focus on vocabulary, grammar, reading and writing practice, listening comprehension and speaking. Your online work provides feedback so you can monitor your progress. All online exercises should be submitted before or on the assigned due date. Online exercises provide students with sufficient opportunity to master the material presented in class and to be optimally prepared to take each quiz. All assignments are graded for completion, not errors.

**QUIZZES:** There is one UNIT QUIZ per UNIT. There are no make-up quizzes UNLESS you have a valid reason for not taking a quiz. Should a student miss a scheduled quiz due to unavoidable circumstances, proof must be submitted. Please ensure that you prepare ahead of time to complete your quizzes before the due date.

**FINAL EXAM:** The final exam is mandatory and comprehensive covering the material in all UNITS.

**Grading:** The final grade is based on the following course components and percentages (see below). Please know that you are graded not for errors, but for effort. A complete assignment will receive full points, but an incomplete assignment will receive a reduced grade for missing components of assignment. All assignments MUST show a score of 09/10 or they do not count as completed.
