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II. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is the first part of a four skills college level introduction to Spanish that promotes language learning in a cultural context. This course will develop students' communicative language with clear and comprehensive grammatical coverage by the presentation of functional language, role-play, small group and personalized activities. Students will engage in cross-cultural comparisons in reading, writing, listening and interview activities. Students will make connections among discipline areas with document readings, internet research and interview activities. There is a mandatory online workbook and lab manual.

Prerequisite: There is no prerequisite for Spanish 101

Technology requirements: This class was designed for people who are comfortable with technology. We will be learning via various modes; videos, audio, visual presentations, and navigating the web. The class will be intense for those who are not comfortable with multimodal instruction that uses various sites to complete your assignments. Be aware that you will be responsible for becoming familiar with all the tools required to complete your assignments. Also be aware that help is always available through campus technology, website assistance, or the instructor. If you are computer and internet savvy, this class is for you. In order to complete your assignments, you will need a webcam and an *free* account to VoiceThread***

IV. COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

The following are based on the national standards for foreign language learners and modified for the level of this course.

1 COMMUNICATION: Communication in languages other than English

- 1.1 Students will engage in conversations, provide and obtain information, express emotions, and exchange ideas by means of online conversations, discussions, and presentations.
- 1.2 Students will express ideas in Spanish and apply written and spoken language on a variety of topics.

- 1.3 Students will present information, concepts, and ideas to an audience of listeners or readers on a variety of topics.
- 2 **CULTURES: Gain knowledge and understanding of other cultures**
 - 2.1 Students will identify and compare the relationship between the practices, products, and perspectives of the culture studied.
- 3 **CONNECTIONS: Connect with other disciplines and acquire information**
 - 3.1 Students will build upon the skills of other disciplines through the foreign language.
 - 3.2 Students will acquire information through various assigned cultural activities to recognize the distinctive viewpoints that are only available through the foreign language and its cultures.
- 4 **COMPARISONS: Develop insight into the nature of language and culture**
 - 4.1 Students will identify and compare the nature of language through comparisons of Spanish, and Spanish-speaking communities, and their own.
 - 4.2 Students will identify and compare the concept of culture through comparisons of the cultures studied and their own.
- 5 **COMMUNITIES: Participate in multilingual communities at home and around the world**
 - 5.1 Students begin to show evidence of their ability to use Spanish to participate in various communities by means of engaging with the community to practicing the language.

V. COURSE REQUIREMENTS/ATTENDANCE

Attendance Policy: Attendance will be recorded by assignment and discussion submissions. Submitting an assignment and participating in discussions will count as class attendance. The instructor will take attendance. A student with excessive absences—15% of total class hours—may be dropped from the class. Students should not assume they will be dropped from the class automatically. Absences do not relieve students from the responsibility for missed assignments and exams. Students must take the initiative in arranging with their instructor to make up missed work. Failure to attend the first week of class will result in the student being dropped. Moreover, tardiness or leaving class early may be noted by the instructor and partial absence recorded.

Class Assignments and Participation: There will be weekly activities in class online, both oral and written, in which the student is expected to fully participate. Weekly Semana folders will be set up with your assignments and additional resources you may need. Read the instructions in the Semana folder each week before starting your work. Some etext assignments will be deemed homework. In order to participate fully, these assignments should be completed before they are reviewed in class.

Weblinks: Many of the conversation assignments will require you to access a weblink before submitting and audio response to your conversation prompt. Many will require you to listen to audio clips. Make sure your computer speakers are turned on and functioning.

Conversation: Our conversations will take place via Voicethread. To create a free account go to www.voicethread.com. Register for a free account. Set up your profile and purchase a webcam to respond to the audio prompts. I will be using the video feature as well. The purpose of this

forum is to create a virtual conversation with the class. An audio response is mandatory to receive conversation credit.

Each conversation assignment will include a picture, an audio prompt and example. You will find the link to your assignment via Voicethread in you assignments folder. An example of a Voicethread is provided below.



*****In the event of technical difficulties, use the screenshot feature to copy the error message you received, attach it to an email and send it to me via email (preferably Blackboard email) in order for your assignment to be accepted. No late assignments will be accepted without proof of technical issues.*****

Online Workbook and Lab Manual: The online workbook and lab manual provides practice of the material presented in your textbook. It is divided into a Workbook section, which focuses on vocabulary, grammar, reading, and writing practice; and a Laboratory Manual section, which focuses on pronunciation and listening comprehension. The online work provides immediate feedback so you can monitor your progress. All online exercises are due on the day of the chapter quiz. Late work will not be accepted. The reason for requiring that online exercises be completed by the scheduled quiz date is so that the student has sufficient opportunity to master the material presented in class and is optimally prepared to take the quiz.

Quizzes and Exams: There will be a quiz at the end of each chapter as well as possible short quizzes on specific topics at the instructor's discretion. There are no make-up quizzes; however, the instructor will drop the lowest quiz score at the end of the semester. Thus, should a student

miss a scheduled quiz due to unavoidable circumstances, the grading consequences are minimized. Only one 'drop' is allowed. Quizzes total 30% of the final grade. There will be a mid-term exam covering material from *Lecciones* 1-3 and a comprehensive mandatory final exam covering the material in *Lecciones* 1 through 5.

Supplementary: In addition to the text and combined online manual, students are expected to complete any and all other homework assignments and projects as required by the instructor.
