Course Description

History 102: Western Civilization II is a survey course designed to provide the student with an overview of European history from approximately 1648 to the present.

Learning Outcomes

- a) Analyze the impact of European expansion and imperialism.
- b) Examine the process and effects of industrialization within the context of events and developments around the world.
- c) Describe the events and effects of two world wars and numerous revolutions.
- d) Trace the effects of post-war recovery and the Cold War on international relationships.
- e) Give examples of the political, cultural, and environmental connections between past and present that have contributed to interrelations among current communities and nations.
- f) Articulate a definition of citizenship that emphasizes the common goals and challenges of a global human community.
- g) Evaluate differences in interpretation generated by diverse primary and secondary sources in historical scholarship.

TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS & TECHNICAL SKILLS

This course will be completed entirely in the online Blackboard Learn environment. Regular access to a computer and basic computer literacy skills are therefore required. Additionally, you will need internet access, basic word processing software (Microsoft Word, Open Office, etc), and Adobe Reader (to access .pdf files). The instructor WILL NOT provide tutorials or training on how to use Blackboard. There are, however, online and face to face tutorials available through UNM Learn here: http://online.unm.edu/help/learn/students/. These are also available within Blackboard.

Skills needed for this course include using Blackboard, using email with attachments, creating and submitting files in Word or PDF formats

ATTENDANCE/PARTICIPATION REQUIREMENTS

Attendance in an online environment: This is not a self-paced course. If a student does not log in and/or complete the assigned tasks for two weeks, in a row or at any two points in the course, he or she will be dropped from the course. Although the course is not self-paced, you do have the opportunity to work ahead. If you choose to do so, remember that you will need to return to the discussion board on Wednesday evenings or Thursdays to respond to the comments of your classmates. Also, be aware that I will not grade any assignments until after the due date given in the syllabus.

You will need to plan specific blocks of time each week to dedicate to this class. To successfully complete all of the work, you should plan on at least 12-16 hours each week for this 8 week course. I tell you this so that you can remember to set aside time that you will dedicate specifically to this course. It is easy to put online classes on the back burner and forget about them. Please do not do that! Devise a weekly schedule that fits your life and allows you to complete all of the assignments by the time they are due each week.

Course Requirements

General Organization

This class is divided into seven two-week units. These units are two weeks in length and cover readings from the primary textbook and supplementary readings posted on Blackboard

Readings and McGraw Hill Assignments

Each student is required to read the assigned chapters and readings and complete quizzes for each chapter.

Tweets

Each student is required to post at least 15 tweets over the assigned chapters and videos for the two week chapter units. At least 5 tweets should address the assigned chapters, 5 should address the assigned videos, and 5 should be in response to tweets posted by classmates.

Discussion Forums

There will be 7 discussion forums in addition to the introductory forum. There are three parts to each discussion forum: 1) you will respond to one of the questions posted by the instructor, 2) you will post a follow-up question building on one of the topics addressed in the instructor's questions and 3) you will respond to at least two of your classmates' posts. Your initial post and follow-up questions are due by the second Wednesday of the unit with responses due by Friday.

Journals

Each unit concludes with a Journal on the second Sunday of the unit. The journals are your reflections about the material covered in the units.

Other Assignments

Each student will write an essay that addresses the supplemental readers.

Each student will also complete a final project over a topic of their choosing.

Summary of Units:

For each unit you are required to:

- 1. Read the assigned chapters
- 2. Watch the assigned videos
- 3. Tweet about the readings and videos
- 4. Complete the quizzes
- 5. Post on the discussion board
- 6. Submit your journal
