ENROLL Embedded Tutoring Pilot

This semester Professor Lily Intong and Writing Consultants Raysa Ramirez and Stephanie Romero have piloted embedded tutoring in Lily's 1110Z classes, which include a face-to-face class, an online class, and a dual enrollment class.







Library Instruction

Library instruction helps students formulate topics, develop search strategies, locate, evaluate, and effectively use targeted, high quality academic sources for any projects or academic product requiring research. These can be anything from short speeches to mufti-media demonstrations to research papers on historical figures in a variety of disciplines and so much more! Instruction sessions are typically conducted in the Library classroom (LRC 143) or in other classrooms or labs in order to provide students hands-on experience using the resources during the session. Sessions can also be conducted in synchronous Canvas courses or Zoom classes or Librarians can provide assistance via email or text. Library instruction can provide general library information or be customized to specific assignment.


Purchase Recommendations

Dosumu Good to see everyone. It's day 3 of the 2nd half of the semester. What I'm seeing and

learning

is that we get a lot of students at our front end - they sign up for both halves at the same time. Second half courses are good for harder classes, those that fail or drop can get a second chance, it's a good feature. Numbers are still the same, even though they came in late. Students are in the classes, we don't need to hunt down new students.

New hires, brought in 6 new people. 2 marketing, 2 new into outreach. Enroll grants, lasts until 27, has some people with it. Outreach people are our sales people, go out and talk to the community about our classes. My focus is to push that a lot. Talking to them about doing faculty & student highlights - put our research out there. Looking at how to get more dual credit students. Our advisors go out to local schools every few weeks. For all intents and purposes we have 10 people doing outreach.

12:07 My focus is on access - reaching students in all locations and bringing learning to them. Looking at transportation - it's not feasible to expect a student to incur debt to buy a car to go to college. What would it take to get a deal with rio transit. Grand Rapids CC made a deal for local



transportation free for their students. Can we do anything for students outside of the I25 corridor?

12:10 Last but not least is the college council. Lots of groups are joining us, tomorrow is our first town-hall meeting. Voice of the campus. I'm not chairing it, more of a committee type thing. Just like I do here, I'll come in, give answers to things. Tell your colleagues for them to join in. With BCCC, our main bone to pick is Los Alamos continuing to not respond to faculty in a way that feels fair. Make sure folks there feel represented by their administration. First in-person meeting at LA later this year
