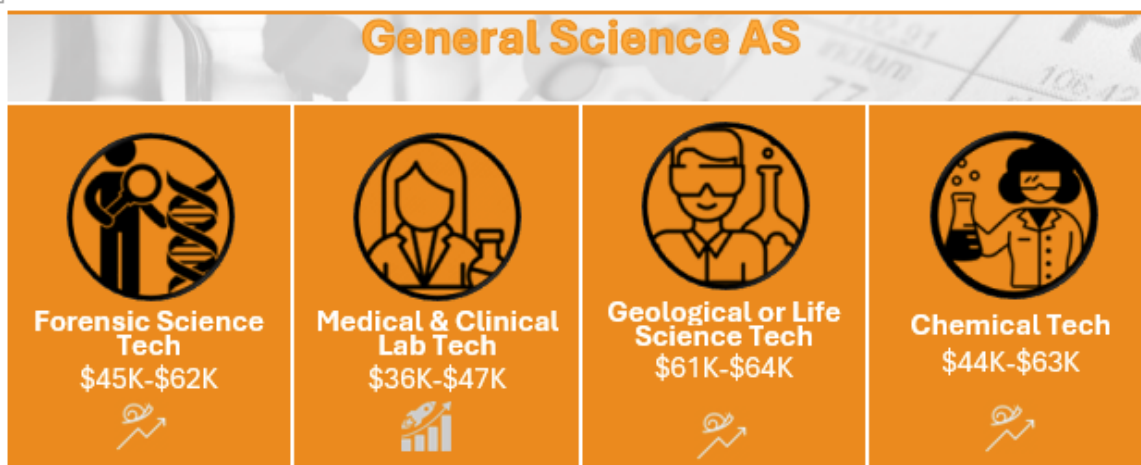

Career and Educational Advancement Opportunities

This is intended to be a transfer program. It includes many requirements for a bachelor's degree in the fields of biology, chemistry, physics, or health sciences. Options within the degree should be determined by the major or profession the student wants to pursue and/or the admission requirements for undergraduate programs or professional schools. Students pursuing this degree may be interested in dental hygiene, medical laboratory sciences, nursing, occupational therapy, physical therapy, pharmacy, physician's assistant, radiology, or medical school in the health sciences. Students wishing to pursue careers that require a basis in Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Environmental Science, etc., may also choose this degree. Most baccalaureate and professional programs are competitive in that they only accept a limited number of students. Grades in science and math courses will be very important and additional standardized testing will be required. UNM-Valencia does have an undergraduate research program where students can begin learning about higher education research. To learn more, talk to your science instructor.
