Describe the steps in creating a behavior management plan to change a health-related behavior. 4. Develop a personal plan to track and change a particular health related behavior. 5. Identify positive health behaviors necessary for one to maintain a high level of personal wellness.

A traditional 3-credit general-education class meets for approximately 3 hours per week for 16 weeks. Since this is an online class, the in-class time is replaced by learning from readings and chapter exercises.</p> <p>Even though this is an online class, you can expect to put in the same amount of time as you would for a traditional class. You may find it impossible to succeed on the more difficult assignments if you wait until the last day before they are due to begin them. Personal Health Management Plans

Towards mid-semester and end of the semester, students will complete a Personal Health Management Plan, setting goals and how they will track their progress.
