Syllabus - REMOTE - Fall 2021 Instructor: André Callot acallot66@unm.edu

Credit Hours

This is a 3 credit-hour course. Students are expected to work on their own and in groups to complete assignments using school-supplied resources within the timeframe outlined for each assignment. The course is remote and asynchronous, meaning that class work will be turned in through the Blackboard Learn website (learn.unm.edu) by midnight Mountain Time the night before the class in which the assignment is due.

Course Learning Objectives

Digital Video Production I is an introduction to motion picture pre-production and production. This class is your opportunity to develop a personal artistic practice as a filmmaker, conscious of the power of images that dominate the spectacle of everyday life. Moving images are some of the most powerful manifestations of this spectacle. I hope that, through this class, you might gain insight into the production and function of these images.

We will concentrate on video production and planning, building the skills necessary to manipulate time and experience as well as images. Course objectives include:

- Plan and produce a digital video project.
- Apply a post-production workflow.
- Work in a team and as an individual to complete digital video projects.

Grades

Grades are based on participation in class critiques and discussions, as well as weekly assignments and two final projects (group and solo). Grades will be divided as so: 20% class participation, 10% solo project, 10% group project, 10% structure project, 10% biography project, 10% magic montage project, 10% duration project, 10% narrative project, 5% performance project, 5% motion graphics project. Projects that satisfy the stated requirements and which are turned in on time will receive full credit. Late projects will be docked a letter grade for each week they are late.

Video project assignments are to be uploaded directly to the Learn Blackboard Discussion Board to the appropriate assignment. Letter grades correspond to point totals:

The student's final grade will be reduced by 1.25% for each week you fail to post responses to the prompts in the Discussion Board.

The student will complete nine production assignments as described below, post to the course Discussion Board, and comment on other students' work in a timely manner.

Class Participation - Each week, 20% of final grade. Comment on discussion boards in all topics, including discussion of student work, discussion of example clips, and discussion of the week's lesson.

Duration Project - Due in Class Three (September 7, 2021) 10% of final grade.

Narrative Project - Due in Class Six (September 27, 2021). 10% of final grade.

Performance Project - Due in Class Eight (October 12, 2021). 5% of final grade. Grade includes script.

Motion Graphics Project - Due in Class Eleven (November 1, 2021). 5% of final grade.

Biography Project - Due in Class Thirteen (November 15, 2021). 10% of final grade.

Magic Montage Project - Due in Class Fourteen (November 22, 2021). 10% of final grade.

Solo Project - Due in Class Sixteen (December 6, 2021). 10% of final grade. Grade includes planning documents.

Structure Project - Due in Class Seventeen (December 13, 2021). 10% of final grade.

Group Project - Due in Class Seventeen (December 13, 2021). 10% of final grade. Grade includes planning documents.

School Production Resources

Production resources for use on course assignments will be available for check-out from the UNM Valencia library, based on availability. The student will reserve production equipment ahead of time and return the equipment to the UNM Valencia library according to the return deadlines set by the library. The student will return the equipment in the condition in which it was checked out, as determined by the UNM Valencia librarian. The student will remove batteries before returning equipment. The student will replace quick-release plates on tripods before returning equipment. The student will pack camera bags, light kits and other equipment in a responsible and professional way, preventing unnecessary damage to the equipment. The student will backup their footage before returning equipment. Failure to respect these instructions may result in suspension or revocation of privileges as determined by the UNM Valencia librarian.

Week One:

August 23, 2021

Class One - Camera

Students will learn the operation of a digital video camera, including focus, framing, exposure, white balance, using the tripod and proper camera etiquette. Students will practice shooting with the camera indoors and outdoors.

Week Two:

August 30, 2021

Class Two - Lighting

Students will practice shooting with lights in mixed lighting and controlled lighting. Students will establish Adobe Creative Cloud accounts and install Adobe Premiere.

Screen selections from *Jeanne Dielman* (1975), *Cries and Whispers* (1972), *Bad Timing* (1980)

ASSIGNMENT ONE - DURATION

Each student will shoot one hour of footage. All shots will be either shorter than fifteen seconds or longer than two minutes. Students will consider color, framing, mise-en-scene, light, movement, exposure, focus, subject and location in each composition. Due in class three.

Week Three:

September 7, 2021 (Class is pushed one day forward due to Labor Day.)

Class Three - Editing

Students will learn the basics of non-linear editing, including file management, moving and cutting clips on the timeline, color correction, transitions, the motion tab and exporting final videos. Students will practice editing the footage they shot for assignment one.

Screen selections from Cleo from 5 to 7 (1962), Velvet Goldmine (1998), Repulsion (1965)

Week Four:

September 13, 2021

Class Four - Continuity

Students will learn traditional continuity shooting and editing. Groups will practice concepts such as shot-reverse-shot, single-character perspective, constructing narrative space, cut-on-action, line of action, cross cutting and simultaneous action.

Screen selections from Volver (2006), Pickpocket (1959), Swimming Pool (2003)

ASSIGNMENT TWO - NARRATIVE

Each student will shoot and edit a one-minute silent narrative with two characters and one location. Students will create continuity through shot selection and editing. Due in class six.

Week Five:

September 20, 2021

Class Five - Story

Students will practice writing visual stories. Students will collaborate on two-page scripts with a beginning, middle and end. Students will attempt to construct narrative desire, suspense and comedy. Scripts will be due in class seven.

Screen selections from Frances Ha (2012), Come and See (1985), l'Age d'Or (1930)

Week Six:

September 27, 2021

Class Six - Screen Assignment Two

Students will watch and discuss the "Assignment Two" projects, keeping an eye toward visual narrative and affect. Students will learn storyboarding, shot lists, casting, budgeting, scheduling. Students will also learn location shooting protocols and production hierarchy.

ASSIGNMENT THREE - GROUP PROJECT PROPOSAL

Students, in pairs, will collaborate on a single five-minute video. Students will create comprehensive plans for the production of their group and solo projects, including shot lists, budgets, schedules and storyboards. Proposals for this project will be due in class eight.

Week Seven:

October 4, 2021

Class Seven - Performance

Students will experiment with different approaches to performance and directing. Psychological realism will be contrasted with ritualistic or choreographic practices.

ASSIGNMENT FOUR - PERFORMANCE

Scenes from class five will be performed in a number of ways, with each student attempting to direct. Videos will be due in class eight.

Week Eight:

October 12, 2021

Class Eight - Group Project Proposals

Class is pushed one day forward due to Indigenous Peoples' Day.

Student pairs will present their project proposals, which the class will discuss.

Students will discuss videos made for the performance project.

ASSIGNMENT FIVE - SOLO PROJECT PROPOSAL

Students will propose a five-minute video project to be completed by themselves. Proposals will be due in class ten.

Week Nine:

October 18, 2021

Class Nine - Animation

Students will learn principles of animation and user interface of Adobe After Effects. Students will practice keying, compositing, basic motion graphics animation, color correction and managing layers.

ASSIGNMENT SIX - MOTION GRAPHICS

Students will create a one-minute animated video in After Effects that incorporates layers of vector graphics animated separately and composited together using masks and chroma key. Due in class eleven.

Week Ten:

October 25, 2021

Class Ten - Solo Project Proposals

Students will present their proposals for their solo projects. The class will discuss these proposals.

Students will learn to create biographical videos that communicate and/or embody an aspect of themselves. Students will consider their own mortality.

Screen It Wasn't Love (1992), Window Water Baby Moving (1962), Valentine For Perfect Strangers (2006)

ASSIGNMENT SEVEN - BIOGRAPHY

Students will make a movie about themselves, using whatever means they choose. Due in class thirteen.

Week Eleven:

November 1, 2021

Class Eleven - Structural Videos

Students will become aware of the hidden structure of video, in its technology, its process and its effects. Students will experiment on the edges of mediated experience, creating works that are unsettling, surprising and unconventional.

Screen Special Effects (1972), Arnulf Rainer (1960), Razor Blades (1968)

ASSIGNMENT EIGHT - STRUCTURE

Students will create a video that addresses a particular structural element of video practice. Due in class twelve.

Students will discuss production plans for group and solo projects. Final solo projects due in class sixteen. Final group projects due in class seventeen.

Week Twelve:

November 8, 2021

Class Twelve - The Movement-Image and The Time-Image

Students will learn to create visual/temporal/narrative content through the juxtaposition of shots in a non-continuous way. Students will learn to use video intuitively to create powerful rituals that transform the mundane into that which is outside of language. Students will identify and destroy internalized cliches and rules that they may not be aware they have built into their artistic practice.

Students will screen and discuss the videos made for the Structure assignment.

Screen selections from *The Holy Mountain* (1973), *Ganja and Hess* (1973), *A Movie* (Bruce Conner)

ASSIGNMENT NINE - MAGIC MONTAGE

Using non-traditional cinema language, create a video that cannot be sufficiently summarized or described. Due in class fourteen.

Week Thirteen:

November 15, 2021

Class Thirteen - The Personal

Students will screen and discuss the videos made for the Biography assignment.

Week Fourteen:

November 22, 2021

Class Fourteen - Magic Montage

Students will screen and discuss the videos made for the Magic Montage assignment.

Week Fifteen:

November 29, 2021

Class Fifteen - Sound

Students will learn to record and edit sound, in sync with video footage, asynchronous with the visual, and in dramatic conflict with the visual. Students will use sound effects, music, voiceover, room tone, and mixing/audio effects to create deliberate and specific sonic events and environments.

December 6, 2021

Class Sixteen - Final Screenings

Students will screen and discuss their solo projects.

Week Seventeen

December 13, 2021

Group projects will be screened and discussed.

Any late projects will be screened and discussed.
