Course Description

This course will introduce students to the concepts, theories, significant findings, methodologies, and terminology that apply to the field of psychology.

Students are introduced to psychology as the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. Overview of the major content areas in psychology. Topics to be covered include learning, cognition, perception, motivation, biological systems, social and abnormal psychology, development, personality, and approaches to psychotherapy. Meets New Mexico Lower Division General Education Common Core Curriculum Area IV: Social/Behavioral Sciences.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of the course students should be able to:

1. Explain how the scientific method and psychological research methodologies are used to study the mind and behavior.
2. Recall key terms, concepts, and theories in the areas of neuroscience, learning, memory, cognition, intelligence, motivation and emotion, development, personality, health, disorders and therapies, and social psychology.
3. Explain how information provided in this course can be applied to life in the real world.
4. Identify the major theoretical schools of thought that exist in psychology as they relate to the self, the culture, and the society.

Specific Student Learning Objectives

Psychology General Education Course (PSY 1110: Introduction to Psychology): Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs)

The Department follows NM HED Area IV and UNM Area 4 Competencies for Social and Behavioral Sciences. General Psychology sets three goals for our students:

Students will demonstrate acquisition of both factual knowledge and the ability to conceptualize and apply this knowledge to their own behavior, to ways of interacting with others, and to their roles in culture and society.

- SLO 2: Students will demonstrate their abilities to apply what they have learned regarding the *basic issues in Psychology* (see above) to factual, practical, theoretical, and philosophical

Students will understand and be able to apply principles of the scientific method and critical thinking.

- SLO 1: Learning will be demonstrated by performance on multiple quizzes, tests, and exams that cover the basic issues in Psychology: methodology, neuroscience, sensation and perception, consciousness, learning, memory, thinking, language, intelligence, motivation and emotion, sexuality, gender and diversity, development, personality, stress and health, disorders, treatments, and social considerations.
- SLO 2: Students will demonstrate their abilities to apply what they have learned regarding the scientific method and critical thinking to theoretical, philosophical, and practical issues

Students will be able to summarize and interpret scientific journal articles and explain how reported findings may affect themselves, as well as their communities, culture, and society.

- SLO 1: Students will be graded on their ability to summarize, interpret, and comment upon scientific journal articles.

Course Requirements

Readings

Each student is required to read the assigned pages in the textbook and any other additional readings/websites.

Attendance

Students enrolled for credit, credit/no credit, or audit **are expected to be actively engaged on-line and work on all assignments, turn in homework, reflection journals, quizzes on-time.** Students may be dropped from the class if they do not keep up with assignments and are not responding to instructor's emails or on-line messages. Since this is an 8-week on-line course, students need to be actively engaged in course work every week. There will be a calendar of when assignments are due. The calendar and announcements will be on UNM Learn/Blackboard as well as here on the syllabus.

Students must take the initiative in arranging with me to make up missed work. Your grade will be affected due to missed assignments, quizzes and exams. It may result in a lower grade or failing class. A student who misses the first-class meeting and has not contacted the instructor, or who misses two consecutive class meetings in the first week may be dropped from the course.

Quizzes, Midterm & Final Reflection Journal

There are 10 multiple choice quizzes online, one midterm exam and one final reflection journal.

Quizzes: You will have one week to do quiz and multiple attempts. Highest quiz grade is recorded. The quizzes will be taken through UNM Learn/ Blackboard.

MidTerm Exam. 50 multiple choice questions take online and it cannot be dropped.

Final Reflection Journal. Instead of a final exam, the students will write a final reflection journal. It will be similar to the chapter reflection journal except that it is 4-5 pages typed and I want students to reflect on the entire course, chapters and topics (see below, semester long project on how to write final reflection journal).

In addition, students will earn points by writing reaction papers or doing homework projects on topics assigned by the instructor. You must do all homework and in class assignments. Homework assignments are not dropped.

Semester Long Project

Students will keep a reflection journal and turn in for every chapter/ lecture topic through UNM Learn/ Blackboard. In the journal, each student will reflect on the readings and lectures/discussions. The students will: **1) try and explain what they learned from the book and lectures, 2) discuss what they found confusing or difficult to understand, 3) discuss what they found interesting and why and 4) reflect on they how can apply what they learned from the readings and lectures to their own personal lives.** Journal must be typed,

double spaced, 12-point font, Arial or Times New Roman Font. 2-3 pages minimum per topic/chapter.

Grading

It is my goal to grade your work within one day (or two) after the due date. If you have questions, please ask me.

Late and Missed Assignments

Assignments are due at the time and date specified. After this time, the assignment is considered late and for each 24-hour period afterwards, 10% will be automatically deducted off the grade. If a crisis occurs, PLEASE inform me as soon as you can so I can work with you accordingly. To keep my sanity as a teacher, there will be no other exceptions to this rule.

Again, due to the potential for Internet outages, log on problems, personal emergencies, illness or anything else that may prevent you from submitting assignments on time, **DO NOT** wait until the last day or minute to submit assignments or take quizzes and the final. The internet may be unpredictable. **Always remember to back up your work!**
