Title of Course:	NURS NMNC 2310 Health and Illness Concepts II	
Course Description:	This course will cover health and illness concepts across the lifespan with the focus on chronic conditions. Concepts covered are related to oxygenation and hemostasis, homeostasis and regulation, protection and movement, and cognition and behavior processes.

Kaplan: You are expected to maintain your Kaplan account. Every course incorporates a 4-part Kaplan testing process. See Handbook for additional information regarding Kaplan grading process. You will take a focused test, remediate that section, take a proctored integrated

test, and remediate that section. The purpose is to expose you to the style of questions to expect on the NCLEX. Kaplan testing and remediation is 20% of the course grade.

Kaplan I-Human: Every level incorporates 4 I-Human cases. Together they will make up 10% of your grade. For level three, you are required to achieve >70% as the grade given by Kaplan to earn the points.

Articles: For each unit, you will complete a nursing journal assignment. See Canvas for additional information.

Tests: There will be 4 tests, roughly every 2-3 weeks. There will not be a cumulative final exam.

EAQs: There will be 10 EAQs (Elsevier Adaptive Quizzes), given through Evolve Sherpath. See Canvas for additional information.
