Course Content:

This course introduces students to core concepts in anthropological theory and method in order to better understand and engage with inter-cultural dialogue in our global world. We will look at the historical roots of ethnographic approaches in the context of their times, to contemporary investigations of how world systems affect local culture and these intertwined relations. Specifically, we will explore social and cultural differences and similarities through various lenses—kinship and social organization, political economy, religion and ceremony, sex and gender, social inequality, art, media and material culture—through focused case studies of diverse cultural groups.

Course Learning Objectives (CLO):

CLO1. To comprehend the development of cultural anthropology in the context of its times, i.e., the history of anthropological theories or "core concepts" of the field

CLO2. To learn the difference between a "theory" and a "method" -- and how they inform one another in anthropological fieldwork. How can we apply what we learn?

CLO3. To critically analyze the inter-connectedness of world systems in order to recognize human causes and conditions to global challenges of today (e.g., resource extraction and waste, causes of climate change and mitigating interventions, cultural nationalism and political power)
