COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to provide students with a fundamental working knowledge of the major trends in the aesthetic, conceptual, and technical aspects of photography from its beginnings in the 1830's to the recent practices of photographers and artists working with photographic technologies. Together we will investigate photography's role as an artistic medium as a central focus, as well as its broader role in our visual, political, and social culture. Textbook readings, online lectures, discussions boards, exams, and other activities will assist students in gaining a critical understanding of photography.

GRADING POLICY

- Grading is based on a timely completion of course assignments, the quality of individual critical development and
 expression, personal commitment, and the ability to work in an online community setting. Personal commitment
 involves regular online participation, consistent effort, completion of work, contributing to class discussions, and the
 general willingness to try.
- Student work is assessed based on the course Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs). There is a grading rubric for the
 class discussions which corresponds to the SLOs. The grading rubric is included in the learning modules on Canvas.
 Rubrics describe how well student work meets the assignment requirements. Students can find feedback from the
 instructor in the grading rubrics on Canvas so that they can see areas of potential improvement.
- No full credit will be given for any late work. If work is not delivered on time, an automatic 0 points will be issued. No
 late discussion postings or quizzes will be accepted. Full credit will never be issued for late work except in extreme
 cases and with <u>prior</u> notification.
 - There can be <u>one</u> missed discussion make-up assignment: To substitute for one missed discussion, a student can write a 500-word article summing up the missed discussion board content. The student will summarize the content of the discussion board posts based on what OTHER students have posted. The student is no longer answering and responding to the initial question(s) posed. This assures the student has read and understands the missed discussion. It is markedly more difficult to read through a discussion and summarize all the content than it is to have answered the question(s) initially. Contact the instructor about how to submit a make-up discussion.
 - Quizzes can not be made up after the due date. Each quiz is open for a set amount of time (usually one week), is open-book/open-note, and can be taken an unlimited amount of times before the due date.
- Incompletes are rarely issued. If 75% of the semester's work/projects/deliverables and participation have been completed with a satisfactory grade, an incomplete may not be issued.

METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

Methods of instruction include the textbook and articles, learning module content, discussions, writing assignments, quizzes, and a final research paper. There is no midterm. All content and resources are posted on Canvas. This course is run from week to week beginning Mondays at 12:01am with most assignments due the following Sunday at 11:59pm MOUNTAIN TIME.

- Learning Module Content Information, instructions, and resources for completing each week's coursework is located in the learning modules on Canvas. Content includes text, images, links, and more.
- Textbook Readings Each week students will read specific chapters of the required textbook (*Photography: A Cultural History*, 5th Edition, Mary Warner Marien).
- Threaded Discussions & Writing Assignments Each week, students will participate in an online discussion. The discussions start with a prompt that students will respond to in writing (initial posts). Initial posts are due by Sunday, 11:59pm. Students need to comment on the posts of at least THREE classmates and respond to any comments they receive. Comments are due by Thursday, 11:59pm and responses are due by the following Sunday, 11:59pm. I encourage you to post throughout the week, and not wait until the last minute. The sooner you post, the better the discussion is.
- Articles There are a few articles to read in addition to the textbook.
- Quizzes There are a few short quizzes at the beginning of the semester covering the syllabus and assigned readings. Throughout the semester, there are weekly quizzes covering the chapters in the textbook. There is one week to complete each quiz. Quizzes are open-book/open-note, are not timed, and can be taken an unlimited

amount of times before the due date. They can not be taken or made-up after the due date.

- Final Research Paper There is one research paper during the last weeks of class. See the "Final Research Paper" section below.
- Other Activities There may be other learning activities associated with the weekly content of the course that can be found in the Learning Modules.

DISCUSSIONS & FINAL RESEARCH PAPER

Discussion Board Writing Assignments | 20 points each | Due approximately every two weeks

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs):

- Students will practice critical-thinking skills.
- Students will evaluate and analyze photographic images.
- Students will demonstrate visual literacy by using language specific to art and photography.
- Students will identify significant photographers or images and explain their significance in history and relevance today.
- Students will practice expressing their ideas through writing.

Assignment Instructions:

View the weekly learning modules on Canvas for additional information specific to each discussion. The discussions open on Mondays. Read the prompt and view the image(s) on the discussion board in the learning module. The prompts are based on the chapters in the textbook that are assigned for the week.

Read the assigned chapters in the textbook. Think about how you want to respond to the prompt and formulate your ideas. You may need or want to reference the readings in the textbook and do additional research online.

In most cases, you will write at least three paragraphs (300-500 words) responding to the prompts. Proofread your writing or ask a friend, family member, or Writing Center consultant to proofread your writing. Submit your written response to the prompt on the Canvas discussion board. These initial posts are due by Sunday, 11:59pm MT.

After students posts their written responses to the prompts on the Canvas discussion board, read through your classmates' initial posts. Comment on the initial posts of at least THREE classmates. Comments are due by Thursday, 11:59pm MT. Respond to *any* comments you receive on your initial posts. Responses are due by Sunday, 11:59pm MT. The earlier you comment and respond, the better the discussion is.

Final Research Paper | 35 points | Due 12/1

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs):

- Students will practice critical-thinking skills.
- After researching photographers/artists and genres/movements, students will be able to demonstrate a basic familiarity of many genres and artists throughout the history of photography.
- Students will be able to identify and analyze the aesthetic styles and visual techniques used by a specific photographer/artist, genre, or movement of their choice.
- Students will explain and describe the historical significance, aesthetic styles, and beliefs or motives of their chosen photographer/artist or genre/movement through writing and support their writing with images.

Assignment Instructions:

The Final Research Paper includes research, writing, and images.

Use the examples in the textbook and the instructor's presentation on the history of photography as a starting point

and continue researching historic photography. Based on your research, choose one photographer/artist, genre, or movement you like from the history of photography to be the topic of your final research paper.

Select 5-10 images made by the photographer/artist or are part of the genre/movement you chose.

Using these 5-10 images as your basis, write at least five paragraphs (700-1000 words) explaining and describing the historical significance, aesthetic styles, and beliefs or motives of your chosen photographer/artist or genre/movement.

Extra Credit: Create 3-5 of your own photos that reflect, incorporate, or are inspired by the styles and techniques used by the photographer/artist or genre/movement you chose. Use any camera you want including your smartphone. If needed, use image-editing apps on your smartphone or computer to adjust your photos to look like the photographer/artist or genre/movement you chose.

Submit your writing and 5-10 images that support your topic (the photographer/artist or genre/movement you chose) on the Final Research Paper discussion board on Canvas.
