Land Acknowledgment: UNM-Valencia is located on the traditional and ancestral Pueblo people and is unceded. This region holds great historical, spiritual, and personal significance for its original stewards, the Native nations and peoples of this area. A note about our times: Over the past few years, we have experienced both the emergence of the global COVID-19 pandemic and the painful consequences of long-endured violence against the BIPOC community. These events have caused, and continue to cause, fear, stress, and pain for many members of our community, and will continue to impact each of us in various ways throughout our lives. Under these circumstances, it is completely normal to feel overwhelmed or anxious, and to have difficulty concentrating. I have designed this course with these challenges in mind, and am committed to continuing to work with all of you to create a positive and supportive learning environment. If your health, well-being, or school work are being impacted, I offer support services and resources in this syllabus. If your needs are not being met in any way, contact me and I will help you find services that will meet your needs as best I can.

Credit-hours: This is a three credit-hour hybrid course delivered online and in-person for 16 weeks. Class meets for two and a half hours of direct instruction per week for the semester, and the other 2 and a half contact hours are fulfilled via the online course portal. Please plan for a minimum of 8 hours of out-of-class work (online assignments, homework, study, open lab, projects, and class preparation) each week.

Course Description

This course will be an introduction to the computer as a medium and fine art tool. The course will explore the history, theory, and contemporary art issues associated with electronic art practice, as well as introduce students to the basic tools and associated technologies. This studio course will introduce simple electronics, software and ideas for working with sound, video, and the internet to create artwork.

Objectives

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of simple electronics and circuit building through the construction of simple sensor based circuits.
- 2. Integrate a knowledge of digital audio recording and analog circuit building with historical concepts from sound art practice to create a simple sound art piece.
- 3. Create a short video art piece informed by historical and theoretical examples.
- Develop a project that uses simple web programming to integrate digital imaging, sound, and video to express
 conceptual approaches informed by historical examples.

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Method of Instruction

Methods of instruction include in-person and online demonstrations, lecture, threaded discussions, reading online articles/websites, watching films/videos and other activities will all presented to you in the classroom and through the Canvas Modules.

Lecture - Lectures will be in-person and/or online, depending on the weekly content. The lecture will be presented in any number of formats, including written, photo, audio, video, and more.

Demonstration - Demos will be in-person and/or online, depending on the weekly content. Online may include video screen capture of me demonstrating the process and techniques for the project, as well as other tutorial videos. Inperson may also include project steps of instruction. The demonstration will be presented in any number of formats, including written, photo, audio, video, and more.

In-class work time - You will have a portion of the in-class portion of our weekly class dedicated to work time. This is an opportunity to practice the techniques and skills you have learned, and to ASK QUESTIONS!

Threaded Discussion - You will be required to participate in online discussions throughout the semester meant to supplement our classroom discussions. The due date for online discussion postings is located on the course schedule, in the Yellow Box in Canvas, sent as an announcement, and discussed during class time. Online, you will post your own message to the listed topic and then post a reply to other student's postings before each due date. I encourage you to post early, and not wait until the last day.

Critique - We will have in-person critiques meant to provide feedback to each other as projects as they are completed. Each project will culminate in a critique, which will consist of pinning up and/or presenting your work via computer/device in the classroom. Being prepared for these critiques, both with your completed work and your readiness to participate in the discussion surrounding your and your peers' artwork, are a meaningful part of the process of creating art. Attending the critique, even if your project is incomplete/late, is extremely important. Critique participation is a percentage of each project grade.

Online Reading/Content - You will be required to read/watch/review a variety of online articles, websites, films and other content. Links to this content will be posted in the Canvas Learning Modules.

Projects - You will have 4 projects, the final project weighing more heavily as it is considered a "final". See "Projects" section below.

Other Activities - There may be other learning activities associated with the weekly content of the course that will be found in the Canvas Learning Modules or presented during class time.

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Participation


Student participation is considered a necessary factor in the learning process. In the classroom, being an active listener and contributing to discussions is extremely important. Asking questions is key! In the online portion of the course, submitting work and responding in forums is considered a necessary factor in the learning process. They are all key to mastering skills and successfully completing projects. You are adults and I expect you to be motivated to grow your knowledge and abilities by engaging in coursework. You are still held responsible for all academic work required regardless of weekly participation and attendance. Class participation influences your grade heavily. Participation includes:

- Successful participation in this course requires access to the correct technology with the necessary computer skills. Please see "Student Responsibilities". I will help you access these if you need!
- You are required to attend class and be prepared for each day's work.
- Students must successfully complete all projects and online requirements and be an active participant in this inclass and online course's community.
- Be prepared to engage in and work on projects in class each week.
- You should log on to this course at a minimum of three times a week and to check your Canvas portal regularly for coursework and any communication from the me or each other.
- You will need to work a few hours each week in addition to the scheduled class times. The online portion will have weekly work. Open Studio hours for working in the lab on campus will be announced.
- Always keep a backup of your work!
- You should strive to complete all work on time. This includes doing the following by the posted deadline dates:
 - You should complete all projects on time (to your best ability), participate in scheduled critiques/class discussions, and maintain a safe, respectable, positive lab environment.
 - Contribute to all online threaded discussions in a timely manner, as well as participate in classroom discussions
 - Complete each Canvas Learning Module successfully and within the timeframe allotted.
 - Students who do not attend the first week of class may be dropped.
- You are REQUIRED to join the REMIND for this class. See "How to Contract the Instructor" section below.

Grading Policy

- Grading is based on completion of course work and projects, the quality of your individual technical and critical development, and a personal commitment to your work. Personal commitment involves regular participation, consistent effort, completion of work, participation in critiques and class/online discussions and the general willingness to try. Make each project meaningful to yourself!
- We will have in-person critiques meant to provide feedback to each other as projects as they are completed. Each project will culminate in a critique, which will consist of pinning up and/ or presenting your work via computer/device in the classroom. Being prepared for these critiques, both with your completed work and your readiness to participate in the discussion surrounding your and your peers' artwork, are a meaningful part of the process of creating art. Attending the critique, even if your project is incomplete/late, is extremely important. Critique participation is a percentage of each project grade.
- If you are submitting work past the posted deadline, it is super important that you communicate your circumstances with me so that we can work out a plan for you to grow and succeed in this art class!
- Incompletes are rarely issued. If 75% of the semester's work/deliverables and participation has been completed with a satisfactory grade, an incomplete may be issued.



Community Support:

We can all reach out to each other, to the whole class, or only to me (the instructor) via the REMIND app. We also have a HELP FORUM discussion board in the UNM Canvas course. Use this as a place to post questions about the course content to the community. These questions are not private! But, if one student has a question about course materials or an assignment, that question is usually shared by their peers. This allows everyone in the course to benefit from each other's questions. I will respond to posts there, but you can help out your peers as well!

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Netiquette

Include a salutation or at least a name. Emails/Messages/Posts do not usually include "Dear," as a letter does, but they do include at least names. When you write to your teacher or classmates, use their name. Informal words of address, such as "Hey," are sometimes appropriate, but may be considered rude by some people.

Include a closing. Close with an appropriate phrase and sign with your name. Signatures help faculty; they may not recognize your email address. Some examples of appropriate phrases are "Many thanks!" or "Thank you for your help."

Use short paragraphs. Because legibility on the screen is not as good as legibility on paper, use short paragraphs (3-4 lines maximum) to make the post/message easy to read. In addition, be sure to skip lines between paragraphs.

Adhere to the conventions of Standard English. Please edit and proofread for spelling errors and grammatical mistakes to the best of your ability. We all have varying abilities and that's ok! Any effort here will be appreciated. I guarantee that I will be making mistakes too!

DO NOT SEND ALL CAP MESSAGES. All capital letters means can be interpreted as screaming. To emphasize a point, <u>underline</u> it or put it in **bold** font.

Participate. In the online environment, it's not enough to show up! We need to "hear" each others' voices to feel presence. Faculty especially need student comments to evaluate their own performance as a facilitator and teacher.

Be persistent. If you run into any difficulties, you should not wait! Contact the professor(me) and/or the proper support services immediately. You can email me multiple times- you are NEVER bothering me!

Share tips, helps, and questions. There are no dumb questions, and even if a solution seems obvious, please share it with classmates! The "Help Forum" and "Remind" are great places for that.

Think twice before pushing the Send button. Both students and professors need to be sure to say just what they meant. How will the person on the other end interpret a message? While no one can anticipate all reactions, read over each message before sending. If you are not sure, you can ask a friend/family member to check it out to see how they may react.

Remember that we can't see the grins on each others' faces. When students or professors make a sarcastic comment, others online can't decipher if the person is serious or not. Explain ideas fully and clearly, and use emojis! (I consider emojis and other symbols that recognize emotion and can share that with the reader to be important and welcome in an academic setting, especially in hybrid/online classes).

Remember that there's a person on the other side. Ask for feedback if you're not sure how your ideas and comments will be construed. If others disagree with what someone has said, "flaming," or ranting at someone else is unacceptable; it's the equivalent of having a tantrum, something most of us wouldn't do in a traditional classroom setting. The classroom is a place for debate and constructive criticism, given with respect. We most likely will have disagreements, and that is a good thing! And we can still have intelligent, kind, honest and respectful conversations no matter what.

Stalking and derogatory comments are inappropriate. Stalking someone, or any derogatory or inappropriate comments, jokes, posts, or emails regarding race, gender, age, religion, sexual orientation are unacceptable and subject to the same disciplinary action that they would receive if they occurred in the physical classroom. If you have concerns about something that has been said to you or about you or other classmates, let the professor(me) know and/or contact the appropriate services, such as the Office of Equal Opportunity.

Projects will be discussed at length and guidelines and demonstrations will be provided in class and the weekly modules on Canvas.
