A note: Over the past few years, we have experienced both the emergence of the global COVID-19 pandemic and the painful consequences of long-endured violence against the BIPOC community. Credit-hours: This is a three credit-hour course delivered in-person for 16 weeks. Class meets for five hours of direct instruction per week for the semester. Please plan for a minimum of 4 hours of out-of-class work (or homework, study, open lab, projects, and class preparation) each week.

Course Description

This course provides direct experience of exploring basic printmaking processes, including relief, intaglio, and monoprint processes, as well as the investigation of materials/media, tools, techniques, history, and concepts of printmaking. Emphasis is given to solving problems through thematic development while producing a portfolio of prints.

Objectives

- 1. Properly operate a printing press and safely handle materials and equipment.
- 2. Demonstrate an adequate ability to utilize basic historical printmaking techniques that are widely relevant to contemporary, artistic expressions.
- 3. Utilize formal elements of art and design (line, shape, value, texture, space, and color), to create prints that are formally sophisticated.
- 4. Create imagery that contains conceptual depth, which can be interpreted by viewers with regard to social, cultural, political, geographical, and/or psychological experiences and relevance.

Student Responsibilities & Course Policies

- Grading is based on completion of course work and projects, the quality of your individual technical and critical development, and a personal commitment to your work. Personal commitment involves regular participation, consistent effort, completion of work, participation in critiques and class discussions and the general willingness to try. Make each project meaningful to yourself!
- Each assignment will culminate in a critique, which will consist of pinning up your work. Being prepared for these critiques, both with your completed work and your readiness to participate in the discussion surrounding your and your peers' artwork are a meaningful part of the process of creating art. Attending the critique, even if your project is incomplete/late, is extremely important.
- If you are submitting work past the posted deadline, it is super important that you communicate your circumstances with me so that we can work out a plan for you to grow and succeed in this art class!
- Incompletes are rarely issued. If 75% of the semester's work/deliverables and participation has been completed with a satisfactory grade, and incomplete may be issued.



Project 1: Self-Portrait - LINO CUT

Objective:

To study two-dimensional design and introduce basic printmaking techniques. To create a self-portrait that introduces us conceptually to you via two-dimensional visual imagery using the lino cut technique. To share with us your values and how you access joy. Demonstrate your knowledge of tearing paper, registration, rolling ink, printing, and curating.

Consider: what objects in your life you would use to describe part of your identity and how you interact with them. Why are these necessary and/or important? How do you see yourself? How do you perceive others see you? Are you thinking of a memory? Dream? Reality? How can we become more empathetic by experiencing your self-portrait edition?

Process:

Carve one linoleum printing plate. Using a reductive technique, print an edition of 5 prints in 3 colors. You will have a total of 5 identical prints each having 3 colors on each print. Use at least 8 pieces of printmaking paper in order to get 5 good prints, allowing 3 for possible mistakes. Because each print will need to have 3 colors, and you are using 8 pieces of paper, you will be running your edition through the press 24 times.

Group critique will discuss design principles and printmaking technique, as well as the visualization of you via your imagery.

Project 2: Boundaries - INTAGLIO

Objective:

Use visual imagery that highlights literal boundaries, and consider how that can become metaphors for your own physical and metaphorical boundaries. Propose an interpretation on imagery you choose to create. Demonstrate your knowledge of tearing paper, registration, plate wiping, inking, printing, and curating.

Consider: what do you feel our class community can learn about you via the exploration of your real and perceived boundaries depicted via the intaglio print. How much of your story can we hold and cherish and love, and how much of it do you feel we deserve to learn? What boundary are you trying to free yourself from? What boundary do you feel is holding you back? Think about boundaries that help and support you, and boundaries that may be limiting to your growth.

Process:

Create one plate using drypoint using a copper plate. Print an edition of 5 prints while incorporating the technique of chine collé, monoprint, xerox transfer, and/or hand coloring. You will need to use 8 pieces of paper in order to have an identical edition of 5 prints, allowing 3 for possible mistakes.

Group critique will discuss design principles and printmaking technique, as well as the visualization of boundaries via your imagery.

Project 3: Habits & Rituals - SILKSCREEN

Objective:

Research your own internal habits & rituals, or that of an external source, such a someone you know, your community, an entire culture, etc.... What do you want your audience to learn by experiencing your prints? What colors explore the emotion you feel in creating your print? Trust yourself and your instincts. Demonstrate your knowledge of tearing paper, registration, squeege inking, printing, and curating.

Consider: who or what is the object of a habit? Who or what is the object of a ritual? How can you depict habit and ritual visually? Are the habits you are sharing good habits or not-so-good habits? Who determines what is good? What is the history of you engaging in your rituals and who benefits from them? Do ritual and habit both create a sense of purpose larger than ourselves? How are habits and rituals different? How are they the same, if they are at all?

Process:

Create imagery via silkscreen. Print an edition of 5 prints on a substrate of your choice: paper, metal, fabric, wood, etc...

Group critique will discuss design principles and printmaking technique, as well as the visualization of habits and rituals via your imagery.

Final Project: Curiosity

Objective:

Explore and develop an idea using imagery to create a narrative. This series should engage the viewer, draw them in, and share your story - your story is super important because you are important. Take this opportunity to think conceptually and explore the definition of curiosity and how that relates to you, your beliefs and values, and your personal truth. Use the time and energy of this process for personal exploration, expression and interpretation.

Consider: What are you curious about? Do you feel that curiosity creates a sense of vulnerability because you have to surrender to some uncertainty? Do you choose to feed your curiosity or starve it at times? Why? Is curiosity a choice? Do you prefer certainty over curiosity? Can embracing discomfort feed curiosity? How can you explore your curiosity as aspect of yourself and your own personal narrative visually? What qualities does printmaking have? How do color and emotion work together? Consider the interactions between what you know and what you do not know?

Process:

Create a composition utilizing any technique that we have used this far in printmaking, or make any combination of them. Feel empowered to combine other artistic media and techniques with the printmaking process. Print an edition of 8 prints using at least 2 colors (each print will be run through the press twice, or for silkscreen, you will need 2 screens). Use 12 pieces of paper to create the edition of 8, allowing for possible mistakes.

Group critique will discuss design principles and printmaking technique, as well as the visualization of curiosity via your imagery.
