COURSE DESCRIPTION

Welcome to Human Sexuality!

This semester you'll be doing some in-depth learning about Human Sexuality. Learning more and talking openly about sexuality is crucial for understanding sexual behavior, the growth and development of our bodies, how we experience our gender roles, what constitutes a healthy relationship, how to have children when and if we want to, how to communicate with our intimate partners, and how to prevent health problems and unwanted pregnancies. Specific areas that will be examined this semester include: the basic knowledge of human sexuality, including anatomical, physiological, psychosocial and ethical components, reproduction, contraception, sexually transmitted disease, and sexual health.

This isn't always a comfortable subject to talk about and that's understandable. While sexuality is an essential and integral part of all stages of human life, the topic is still taboo in almost every country. One important outcome of this online course will be for you to explore your comfort level in expressing, inquiring and learning about human sexuality.

This class environment is intended to be a safe space for having peer discussions and private reflections about what you are learning throughout the semester. I encourage a learning atmosphere of mutual respect, openness to learning new and unfamiliar topics, and a deepening personal understanding of human sexuality.

COURSE PREREQUISITES & OBJECTIVES

There are no prerequisites for this course.


Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Discuss current research methods in human sexuality issues relevant to principles and theories that help promote a healthy sexual life.
- 2. Analyze female and male sexual anatomy and physiology, conception and contraception, pregnancy, childbirth, abortion, sexual behaviors and fantasies, sexual dysfunction, sexual coercion, concepts about sexually transmitted diseases, and HIV/AIDS.
- 3. Evaluate developmental perspectives relevant to sexuality and childhood, adolescence, adulthood, sexuality and disability, sexuality over a lifespan, gender identity, orientation, and gender roles.
- 4. Compare psychosocial perspectives related to the notions of loving and being loved, and the concepts of intimacy, relationships, and communication during sexual relationships.
- 5. Examine laws and religious and ethical perspectives on sexuality.
- 6. Develop an appreciation for the role evidence-based research plays in our understanding of human sexuality in a changing world.

As you know, this is an 8-week, 3-credit class. This class is condensed from a traditional 3-credit class that meets for approximately 3 hours per week for 16 weeks, so you can **expect to put in the same amount of time as you would for a traditional 16-week class.** Since this is an online class, the in-class time is replaced by learning from readings and a variety of activities. It is expected that this class will require about 10-12 hours of your time per week.

There are some assignments this semester that are important to start working on in advance of the due date. I encourage you to avoid waiting until the last day before they are due to begin them.

SYLLABUS & SCHEDULE QUIZ

During the first week of class, you'll read over the syllabus and schedule and complete the Syllabus Quiz, including answering a question that states you read and understand the syllabus.

INTRODUCTION VIDEO

Each student will introduce themselves by video and comment on at least 2 other introduction posts from other students. Please be respectful. If you notice there are students who have not received feedback yet, respond to those students. This will allow us to get to know one another.

CHAPTER ACTIVITIES: ASSIGNMENTS, JOURNALS & COURSE DISCUSSIONS

Students will submit all activities on UNM Canvas. Activities include weekly assignments, journals, course discussions, quizzes and semester projects.

There are 6 assignments throughout the semester.

There are Journal Reflection activities every 2 weeks, which provide students with the opportunity to reflection on any aspect of what is being learned in the course. There are 4 Journal Reflections throughout the semester.

Each student will participate in the biweekly course discussions. Part of the discussion includes responding to at least two other student posts. Please be respectful, especially as we discuss topics that may feel uncomfortable or may be based on student experience, beliefs, culture, etc.

- Initial posts by Thursday by 11:59 PM the week the course discussion is due
- Response posts to at least two other students' original posts are due by Sunday by 11:59

****COURSE DISCUSSIONS PURPOSE****: Participating in Course Discussions is a valuable way to interact with your classmates and engage in dialogue that typically happens in a face-to-face environment. Fully participating in the discussion by posting a descriptive initial post and

providing thoughtful responses to your classmates allows the instructor to evaluate your understanding of the course content and your critical-thinking and communication skills.

Because there can be sensitive topics covered in this course, if a student is impacted by a topic/activity due to past experiences, please email me and I can assign you a substitute activity.

QUIZZES

There are 4 biweekly quizzes throughout the semester. Each quiz will cover assigned chapters, discussions, and assignments from the previous two weeks of class. There is no cumulative final quiz or exam.

SEMESTER PROJECTS

There are 2 semester projects. The first project is a Human Sexuality Movie Critique due midsemester. The Final Semester Project has 2 options for students to complete, either completing a Sexual Self-Assessment OR completing a report about a human sexuality topic of interest. Each student chooses the option they're most interested in completing.

- Keep up-to-date of course announcements
- Keep me informed of class related problems, or other problems that keep you from full participation

GRADING

All work will be equally weighted. There is a total of 300 points to be earned.
