Course Requirements

Readings

Each student is required to read the assigned pages in the textbook and any other additional readings/websites.

Attendance

Students enrolled for credit, credit/no credit, or audit <u>are expected to attend all class</u> <u>sessions.</u> The instructor will take attendance. A student with excessive absences—15% of total class hours—may be dropped from the class. Please note that this is less than 3 classes. Students should not assume they will be dropped from the class automatically. Absences do not relieve students of the responsibility for missed assignments and exams. Students must take the initiative in arranging with me to make up missed work. Presentations days are mandatory. Your grade will be affected due to excessive absences. A student who misses the first-class meeting and has not contacted the instructor, or who misses two consecutive class meetings in the first week may be dropped from the course. A student with excessive absences may be dropped from a course.

Quizzes & Final Exam

There are 10 multiple choice quizzes online, one midterm exam and one final comprehensive exam.

Quizzes: You will have one week to do quiz and three attempts. Highest grade is recorded. The quizzes will be taken through Blackboard. The lowest quiz will be dropped.

Final Exam. Comprehensive final exam given on the last day of class. Final exam will consist of 50 multiple choice questions. Cannot be dropped. Midterm and Final exam are multiple choice and taken in class. There will be fifty questions on the midterm and fifty questions on the final exam.

In addition, students will earn points by writing reaction papers or doing homework projects on topics assigned by the instructor. You must do all homework and in class assignments. Homework/In class assignments are not dropped.

Semester Long Project

Students will keep a journal and turn in every week. In the journal, each student will reflect on the readings and lectures/discussions. The students will: 1) try and explain what they learned from the book and lectures, 2) discuss what they found confusing or difficult to understand, 3) discuss what they found interesting and why and 4) reflect on they how can apply what they learned from the readings and lectures to their own personal lives. Journal must be typed, double spaced, 12-point font, Arial or Times New Roman Font. 2-3 pages minimum per week.

Grading

It is my goal to grade your work within one week of the due date. If you have questions, please ask me.

Late and Missed Assignments

Assignments are due at the time and date specified. After this time, the assignment is considered late and for each 24-hour period afterwards, 10% will be automatically deducted off the grade. If a crisis occurs, PLEASE inform me as soon as you can so I can work with you accordingly. To keep my sanity as a teacher, there will be no other exceptions to this rule.

Again, due to the potential for Internet outages, log on problems, personal emergencies, illness or anything else that may prevent you from submitting assignments on time, <u>do not</u> wait until the last day or minute to submit assignments or take quizzes and the final.

Addendum to the Syllabus

Classroom policies and procedures.

I have seen many behaviors over the course of my years of teaching that I have found very disrespectful to myself and other students. I feel it is necessary to have these policies to try and bring civility back to the classroom.

- 1. <u>Absences.</u> Attendance is required for all class periods. <u>I take attendance very seriously.</u> If you cannot make it to class on a regular basis, I would strongly suggest finding another course. **DO NOT** make doctor's appointments during my scheduled class periods. Also do not make appointment to meet with other instructors for conferencing during my scheduled classes. You will be counted absent in these cases.
- 2. <u>Laptops.</u> Students will not be allowed to use a laptop in this class unless it is for the sole purpose of taking notes. Any other use such as surfing the internet, IM, e-mail or Facebook, etc. is not allowed in my class. If it is discovered that this is occurring the student will be told to shut off the laptop and not bring it to class again.
- 3. **No Headphones.** You are not allowed to have headphones in your ears during class.
- 4. <u>Cell Phones</u>. Cell phones must be turned off during class. Unless it is an emergency then you need to have your cell phone turned on silent & vibrate mode. If you must take the call, please leave the classroom and talk outside. Text messaging is not allowed in class. Anyone caught texting in class while be warned and if it occurs again, told to leave the class.
- 5. <u>Homework from other classes</u>. You will not be allowed to do homework for other classes during my class period. Please do it before or after my class.
- 6. <u>Books, magazines, newspapers, etc.</u> are not allowed in my class. If you are caught reading other materials not related to the class (such as the textbook), you will be asked to refrain from doing so.
- 7. **Respecting others opinions**. I firmly believe that we must have respect for each other and to try and be civil to one another. Anyone swearing, hollering or being disrespectful to myself or others will not be tolerated and the person will be asked to leave the class.
