Syllabus CRIMINAL COURTS AND PROCEDURE CJUS 2120-501

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Pre-requisite: none Credit hours: 3

Course Description:

An examination of the constitutional principles related to the investigation of crimes, arrests, confessions and pre-trial processing of offenders. The focus will be on individual rights found in the First, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Eighth, and Fourteenth Amendments of the United States Constitution and the comparable provisions of the New Mexico Constitution.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. Identify the rights of individuals and their application to real-life events.
- 2. How criminal procedure has developed and its role in our modern day criminal system.

Instructional Methods:

A variety of teaching strategies may be utilized in this course, including but not limited to: lecture, discussion, written classroom exercises, group and/or individual projects, videos, quizzes, exams, reading assignments, writing assignments, interactive exercises and internet research.

Attendance policy:

You should be present in the online course room at least three times per week. You will be required to post within the first two weeks or you may be withdrawn from the course.

Grading policy:

Discussion postings = 25% of the grade.

You will be required to post an answer each week to the weekly question in the discussion section. Your answer should be a minimum of 100 words and should include citations if appropriate. These postings are due on Tuesday of each week. You will also be required to respond to two of your classmates' answers to the weekly question. Your responses should be a minimum of 50 words. Your response should be more than just good job or well done; your responses should further the discussion.

Weekly Quizzes = 25% of the grade

You will be required to complete a weekly quiz which assesses your understanding of the content assigned for that week. You have 30 minutes to complete the quiz and you will be allowed one attempt. Quizzes are closed book.

Weekly Assignments = 50 % of the grade. Your response should be about 500 words using APA formatting and citation method which includes in-text citations as well as a reference page. Your assignment is due on Sunday by 11:59 pm.

Generally, late assignments will not be accepted. If an emergency arises please contact me as soon as possible to discuss whether I will allow an exception given the circumstances.
