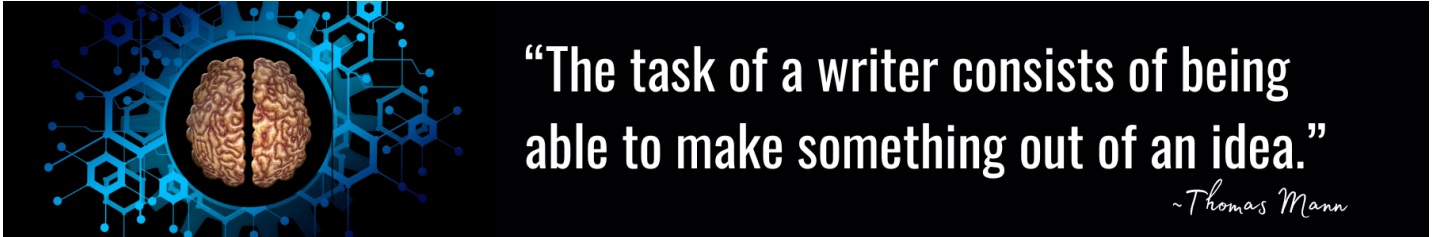

WELCOME TO ENGLISH 1120!

You have arrived in English 1120, and your freshman English requirement is almost satisfied! English 1120, also called Composition II, is a Freshman-level core class in which you will continue to hone your critical thinking, reading, and writing skills. In this class, we will examine an artistic work to discern the argument, practice research and writing strategies, and continue exploring quality communication.

This will not be an easy class—expect to work hard. Even if writing comes easily to you, I will expect you to stretch yourself and work to the highest standard possible as you practice the important skills you need to be a credible communicator in this world.

Along the way, I ask that you remember this: Your growth as a writer is up to you. Becoming the writer you want to be requires you to make choices in your communication. I hope you think of this class as just one stretch along a lifelong pathway because writing is a journey more than a destination.

Wanna know a secret to acing this class? Here you go: Your Effort is Everything. If you show up, engage with the course materials, pay close attention to the details, and put forth the effort required to complete the assignments, you will do well!

An important aspect of your work in this class will be reflective writing. One of my favorite things about teaching writing is reading my students' reflections on their writing process. Reflective writing is designed to give you a chance to think about your thinking and your writing, then explain your intent to me. I encourage you to embrace the reflection process in our class and don't be afraid to try something new. If you feel unsure about your choices, please share your concerns in your reflection. I'm not looking for perfect writing; I'm looking for curiosity, effort, and a willingness to try new things. I hope that, along the way, you'll come to love writing as much as I do—if you don't already! I am very happy you're here!

CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

In this course, students will explore argument in multiple genres. Research and writing practices emphasize summary, analysis, evaluation, and integration of secondary sources. Students will analyze rhetorical situations in terms of audience, contexts, purpose, mediums, and technologies and apply this knowledge to their reading, writing, and research. Students will sharpen their understanding of how writing and other modes of communication work together for rhetorical purposes. The emphasis of this course will be on research methods. Meets New Mexico General Education Curriculum Area 1: Communication. Prerequisite: 1110 or 1110Y or 1110Z or ACT English =26-28 or SAT Evidence-Based Reading and Writing=660-690 or Lobo Course Placement (LCP)-English =30.

CREDIT-HOUR STATEMENT:

This is a three-credit-hour course. Class meets in person every Monday (except for the Monday of Spring Break; March 13) starting on January 23 until May 1 during the Spring 2023 semester. Students are expected to complete a minimum of six hours of out-of-class work (or homework, study, assignment completion, and class preparation) each week.

During the first two week, you'll get acquainted with our online classroom and with me, your professor, and write a message to me in which you explore your goals for the semester. **This assignment is required—if you do not turn it in, and do not reach out to me if you have trouble meeting that deadline I will drop you from the class.**

I do not accept assignments by email for any reason.

Please always double-check all your assignment submissions to ensure they've uploaded correctly and completely, and save your submission receipts! If Canvas glitches, I will not hold you responsible for any late work, but you **MUST** have proof of the glitch. If you do not get a preview of your submission, try submitting it again. If it still doesn't work, reach out to tech support.

GOALS:

1. Analyze communication through reading and writing skills.
 2. Employ writing processes such as planning, organizing, composing, and revising.
 3. Express a primary purpose and organize supporting points logically.
 4. Use and document research evidence appropriate for college-level writing.
 5. Employ academic writing styles appropriate for different genres and audiences.
 6. Identify and correct grammatical and mechanical errors in their writing.
 7. Students will access Libros library database software and find a book relevant to the writing project.
 8. Students will learn how to skim the book and find quotations that are both relevant and appropriate for the paper.
 9. Students will be able to identify what type of database source they have found, e.g. magazine, journal, newspaper, website.
 10. Students will write a correctly formatted Works Cited page.
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GRADING AND FEEDBACK:

NEWSFLASH: Grades are rarely an accurate representation of learning. That said, I also understand that they are the currency of school and it feels good to see a reward for your efforts. Plus, I'm required to assign you a grade at the end of the semester. So, here's how things work

around here: You will earn full credit for each assignment that reflects thought, effort, learning, and rubric alignment. You will also receive feedback on your work when appropriate and you are expected to read or listen/watch that feedback, depending on how I deliver it.

Feedback will often include a next step for you to respond to, so if you do not read or listen/watch that feedback you will be unable to achieve full points for the linked assignment.

The total points possible this semester: 1000. You need to earn at least 73% to pass the class. A C- is *not* a passing grade in college.

LATE WORK POLICY:

Deadlines are a reality you will face your entire life. In our class, deadlines ensure that I can assess and return your work to you so that the feedback is helpful to your learning. It's very hard for me to complete a grading cycle only to have another part of that grading cycle show up in my grading queue. That said, your assignments are due on Sundays at 11:59 pm, but the assignment portal will remain open until I finish grading that particular assignment for everyone. After that, I will close the portal and we will move on. As long as the portal is visible to you, you may turn in your assignment.

If you have an urgent situation that makes it difficult for you to complete your work at any time, please be in touch. I will work with you to support your success by helping determine a new deadline or other accommodation.
