

Course Description:

An exploration of developmentally, culturally and linguistically appropriate, formal and informal research- based assessments and teaching strategies in the teaching of reading in grades K-8. This course includes a structured 10-hour field component.

Course Goals:

This course prepares future Educational Assistants and Teachers to use research- based assessments and teaching strategies in the teaching of reading in grades K-8.

Student Learning Outcomes -- The student will

- 1. Implement developmentally, culturally and linguistically appropriate researchbased assessments to guide reading instruction for all students.
- 2. Implement research-based techniques and strategies for teaching reading at the elementary level including phonics, phonemic awareness, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension.

- 3. Demonstrate an understanding of the role of phonological awareness, letter learning and phonics in learning to read.
- 4. Analyze texts for challenges and opportunities to learn.
- 5. Identify the connections between reading, writing, and oral language in all instructional contexts.
