ENGL 2660 - 501: World Literature II Online MAX

Course Description

In this course, students will read selections of ranging from the Renaissance through modern publications. Students will broaden their understanding of literature and their knowledge of other cultures through exploration of how literature represents individuals, ideas, and customs of world cultures.

English 2660 World Literature II is a sophomore-level literature class in which you will read excerpts of works and write guided analyses of your reading. Each week students will complete a reading and writing assignment, as well as engage in a discussion with their professor and peers. The goal of this class is to become familiar with great stories and hone your analytical thinking and writing skills. Remember that there are no "right answers," only analyses supported by evidence found in the assigned texts. World Literature provides a view into realities far removed from our own that yet resonate with us because they are written by and for human beings trying to make sense of their place in the world.

Our readings will traverse the world: we will encounter fiction, drama, poetry, and nonfiction from Africa, Asia, the Arab world, Europe, and the Americas. Throughout the course we will ask the following questions: Why do the same kinds of stories appear in many different literary traditions across time and space? Do narratives travel from one site to another, or do similar forms and plots emerge independently in societies that find themselves on the brink of modernity?

Course Objectives

Students will be able to:

- **identify** and **situate** key authors and literary works within their historical and cultural contexts in class discussions and in written literary analyses.
- **integrate** knowledge from the readings into productive class discussion in order to propose viable interpretations of class material and argue for the validity of their claims.
- **illustrate** an understanding of course material and interpretive strategies by completing weekly reading assignments, contributing to the collected knowledge in weekly discussions, and preparing polished literary analyses on course material.

Course Expectations

Students will be expected to log into Canvas and complete the following each week:

- Complete the weekly reading assignments as designated by our course schedule document and at the beginning of each module overview (readings are in Compact Anthology of World Literature parts 3, 4, and 5 PDFs provided to students)
- Watch videos, including brief lecture video, and read supplemental material as designated in each module
- Post to weekly discussion board AND reply to two (2) peers' posts by Sunday of each week
- Submit Response Writings on the topic of choice each week
- Check email daily, check Canvas Announcements daily for reminders from professor

Tracking Course Activity

Canvas automatically records all students' activities including: your first and last access to the course, the pages you have accessed, the number of discussion messages you have read and sent, web conferencing, discussion text, and posted discussion topics. This data can be accessed by the instructor to evaluate class participation and to identify students having difficulty. Students that miss the first two weeks' assignments will be dropped from the course, as this is equivalent to being absent beyond the acceptable limit.

Required Supplementary Materials:

Every week, there will be videos for you to watch in the corresponding course module. Some videos will be short lectures, others will be from outside sources on the web. These videos and articles will help bring the texts to life and allow you to more deeply engage with the weekly discussion.

Instructor Response Time

Email is the best way to contact me if you have questions. I routinely check the course for postings or emails and sometimes on the weekend. You can anticipate a 24-to-48-hour response from me, Monday – Thursday. I will try and respond to all weekend (Friday afternoon to Sunday) emails and postings by noon on Monday or earlier.

Procedures for Completing Coursework

All written work needs to be submitted online, on time, and in MLA format. If you have difficulty using a tool to complete work, please reach out to UNM's <u>Canvas Support</u> immediately and notify your instructor as well. Work must be submitted on time, meaning prior to the set due date. Late work will not be accepted unless the student communicates with the instructor prior to the work being late about an extension.

Assignments

Over the course of the semester, your grade will be comprised of the following assignments:

- Weekly Response Writings (+1 Extra Credit)
- Weekly Discussion Posts and Peer Responses
- A final literary analysis paper/reflection
- Syllabus quiz and sporadic reading quizzes

Expectations for Participation

This is a three credit-hour course delivered in an entirely online modality over 16 weeks during the Spring 2025 semester. Please plan for a *minimum* of 8 hours per week to learn course materials and complete assignments.

Netiquette

In this course, we will discuss literature from across the world and from varying cultures across time. Students will remain kind, respectful, professional, academic, and mindful when posting in weekly discussions. Students will remember that not everyone has the same lived experiences, and they will do their utmost to make all classmates feel welcomed, respected, and appreciated. This includes avoiding humor (humor can be difficult to understand when written, even if the writer means well), capital letters, and being mindful of punctuation. No offensive language or hostile postings will be tolerated. The study of literature requires us to expand our way of thinking, especially for this class, far into the past and into different ways of life.

Our course is a safe, welcoming space, and all communications between students and the instructor will be conducted with kindness, respect, tolerance, and mindfulness of the experience of others.

Grading Procedures

Grades will be determined by students' demonstrated effort, adherence to instructions as detailed on assignment prompts, proper use of MLA format, and timeliness. Analytical writing looks different from person to person, so as long as effort and reflective thinking are demonstrated, work will receive full credit if submitted on time. Discussion board postings or responses that are too brief, exhibit limited reflection or analysis, or do not follow instructions will lose significant points.
