Specific Course Requirements

This course is a co-requisite for Math 100 and is intended to supplement the work you will be doing in that class. Attendance and participation are required to complete this class successfully. You will also be completing a final project and presentation on a mathematical topic from math 100 or learning concept of your choice. The details will be provided to you.

Coursework:

Attendance and Participation (30% of your final grade)

- You are expected to attend every class meeting on time and stay the entire class. Points will be deducted for tardiness or leaving early.
- There will be class activities, discussions, and group collaboration.
- You are expected to contribute to and/or participate in all activities, discussions, and collaborations.

Absences: I do not require documentation for missing class. I do ask that you communicate with me via UNM email. If you start to fall behind, please talk to me so we can figure out what you need to do to succeed in this class. You are expected to complete all assignments missed during absences.

Here are some of the reasons you may be dropped from the course:

- If you miss the first week of the semester
- If you miss more than 3 classes
- If you miss 3 or more assignments without contacting me to discuss making them up **If you are** dropped from or withdraw from Math 100, you will be dropped from Math 1996

Do not depend on me to drop you if you decide not to take the class. You are responsible for withdrawing if you decide not to complete the course.

Class Activities/Discussions (40% of your final grade)

- There will be daily activities, videos, discussions, group work, etc. that will correspond with your math 100 class.
- These activities will be completed mostly in class and you are responsible for any missed due to absence. If you need more time than given in class to complete, it will be due at the beginning of the next class

Final Project (30% of your grade)

Your final project will consist of a presentation on the mathematical topic or learning concept of your choice. The presentation should be 8-12 minutes. You can present using Powerpoint, a written paper, poster, or any reasonable tools to aid with your presentation. You will turn that in to me the day you present. Details will be provided at a later date.

Instructor Response Time
