#### **Course Description**

This course is an introduction to the scientific study of human social influence and interaction, and explores how an individual's actions, emotions, attitudes and thought processes are influenced by society and other individuals. Prerequisite: 1110.

#### **Required Text & Internet Access**

- Aronson, E., et al (2024). *Social Psychology (11<sup>th</sup> ed)*. Pearson Publisher (E-book already added to CANVAS -Redshelf)
- Access to CANVAS (internet) is required to submit assignments. Students will need a computer (preferably with a camera and audio) and access to the internet. Assignments will be found on CANVAS. Go to course information and then there are folders in middle. I will over with you in a Zoom video about using UNM Learn/Blackboard, syllabus, course requirements/ assignments, etc. I will email you details about the Zoom video to your @unm.edu email account.

#### **Student Learning Outcomes:**

Upon completion of the course students should be able to:

- 1. Identify concepts, theories, scientific methods, and research findings relevant to social psychology.
- 2. Explain how situational, social, and individual factors influence behavior.
- 3. Apply social psychological concepts to real-life events, current social issues and problems, and one's own life.

## **Course Requirements**

#### Readings

Each student is required to read the assigned pages in the textbook (e-book) and any other additional readings/websites.

#### **Attendance**

Students enrolled for credit, credit/no credit, or audit <u>are expected to be actively engaged on-line and work on all assignments, turn in homework, reflection journals, quizzes on-time.</u> Students may be dropped from the class if they do not keep up with assignments and are not responding to instructor's emails or on-line messages. Students need to be actively engaged in course work every week.

Students must take the initiative in arranging with me to make up missed work. Your grade will be affected due to missed assignments, quizzes and exams. It may result in a lower grade or failing class. A student who misses the first-class meeting and has not contacted the instructor, or who misses two consecutive class meetings in the first week may be dropped from the course.

#### Quizzes, Reflection Journals and Final Oral Presentation

There are 13 multiple choice quizzes online, 13 reflection journals and one oral presentation which will count as the final.

**Quizzes:** You will have one week to do quiz and multiple attempts. Highest quiz grade is recorded. The quizzes will be taken through CANVAS.

#### **Semester Long Project**

Students will keep a reflection journal and turn in for every chapter/ lecture topic through CANVAS. In the journal, each student will reflect on the readings and lectures/discussions. The students will: 1) try and explain what they learned from the book and lectures, 2) discuss what they found confusing or difficult to understand, 3) discuss what they found interesting and why and 4) reflect on they how can apply what they learned from the readings and lectures to their own personal lives. Journal must be typed, double spaced, 12-point font, Arial or Times New Roman Font. 2-3 pages minimum per topic/chapter.

## **Oral Presentation (50 points total):**

Pick a topic relevant to this course which must be approved by the instructor (see list in Other Content folder. Research your topic using the internet and textbook. Create an MS PowerPoint, Prezi, or Google Slides Presentation. Three references must be included for the presentation. The presentation will consist of 25 slides minimum, including a title slide and a reference slide. Your presentation will be 20 minutes long and you will email the slides prior to your presentation.

## **Grading**

It is my goal to grade your work within one day (or two) after the due date. If you have questions, please ask me.

#### **Late and Missed Assignments**

Assignments are due at the time and date specified. After this time, the assignment is considered late and for each 24-hour period afterwards, 10% will be automatically deducted off the grade. If a crisis occurs, PLEASE inform me as soon as you can so I can work with you accordingly. To keep my sanity as a teacher, there will be no other exceptions to this rule.

Again, due to the potential for Internet outages, log on problems, personal emergencies, illness or anything else that may prevent you from submitting assignments on time, <u>DO NOT</u> wait until the last day or minute to submit assignments or take quizzes and the final. The internet may be unpredictable. <u>Always remember to back up your work!</u>
