## COURSE DESCRIPTION

Art Practices I is the first of two required interdisciplinary art studio courses that explore the processes, ideas, and diverse media of visual arts at the foundational level. This course addresses the thematic concepts that are central to the nature of art making today. This first semester's assignments will investigate issues of Light, Frame, and Mark. A slide lecture, an assigned reading, and a short response paper will accompany each project. Visual problem solving will be emphasized throughout the course, in addition to an in-depth exploration of various materials and the nature of artistic meaning. The course will culminate in each student creating a final portfolio of the artworks they created during the course.

## Course Objectives

By completing this course students will be able to:

1. demonstrate how frame, light, and mark can be used to communicate ideas in visual art.
2. produce two-dimensional, three-dimensional, and time-based art works.
3. develop a research practice that informs the development of art works.
4. critically analyze works of art.
5. assemble a final portfolio of artworks created during the course.

## Credit Hour Statement

This is a three credit-hour course. Class meets for two two hour and forty five-minute sessions of direct instruction for fifteen weeks during the semester. Please plan for a *minimum* of six hours of out-of-class work (or homework, study, assignment completion, and class preparation) each week.

## Teaching and Learning Strategies

This is an in-person class with web-based components delivered via Canvas, UNM's online learning platform. Lectures, demonstrations, slide shows, assignments and exercises, reading discussions, critiques, and regular in-class one-on-one discussions with the instructor will be used as the learning tools in this class.

  - I recommend rotating / swivel blades for easier cutting with intricate designs. Suggested brands: VViViD 360 Degree Comfort Grip Swivel Blade Craft Cutting Knife, LAINIUTE Craft Cutting Tools,360 Degree Rotating Cutting Tools,Art Cutting Tools with Cutting Pen, or any brand/item similar

## STUDIO REQUIREMENTS

### **Studio Work Sessions and Preparation**

This is a hands-on course, and productive in-class work is expected. Plan ahead to bring necessary tools and materials each day.

Limit phone use—texting and social media should be minimal. Listening to music is fine on work days, as long as it doesn't disrupt your focus or the class. No videos—keep screens down to stay present.

For everyone's safety, wear appropriate clothing: closed-toed shoes, work clothes, and gloves or eye protection as needed. Use caution with tools like blades, hot glue guns, and installation materials. Keep personal items and food out of the way to maintain a clean, safe workspace.

Clean up after yourself. Use the flat file drawer for paper or flat projects and claim a cubby for supplies or mid-size work. Storage of large projects must be limited to keep shared space accessible for all.

*Please put your phones away during class time unless you are using it for research or documentation during studio work time.*

### **Open Studio Hours and Studio Etiquette**

Open studio hours (posted on classrooms) are available outside class—use them to work and build community. Most drawing supplies are in Room 105; request permission to use supplies in other rooms. Treat all tools and materials with care, return them after use, and do not take them home. Borrowed books must be returned promptly.

Division Lab Technician and Work Study students can answer questions during open studio but cannot assist with individual projects

### **Locker/ Cubby Policy**

Lockers and Cubbies are available for your material and tool storage. Locker/Cubby use is contingent upon enrollment in a Fine Arts class. Claim a locker/cubby by labeling it with your name, semester, and year. For lockers you must provide your own lock. All lockers/cubbies must be cleaned out at the end of each semester. Failure to do so will mean the lock will be cut and belongings removed.

## CLASS REQUIREMENTS

### Attendance

This course is being taught in-person. Students meet in person for every class to get the most out of in-person studio activity. Class is held in the Business and Technology Building at UNM-Valencia Campus, Room 106) during the days and times at times at the top of this document. Please make every effort to show up to class on time, prepared, and ready to work. While all course content will be delivered in person, most of the content will also be offered online via UNM Canvas. Students who complete and participate in all course materials in person and turn their work in using Canvas will get the most out of their time in this course and will see a higher final grade.

Because this class is largely experiential (based on what we do in class), students who attend and participate in every class will get the most out of the course. If an absence is unavoidable, it is appropriate for you as the student to reach out to notify me immediately and then obtain notes, assignments, and other relevant information *from classmates*. Students can be absent 3 times (excused or not) without impact to their grade. After that, each consecutive absence will result in a drop of their grade by one degree (ie: A to A-). Students will be marked tardy if arriving after five minutes into the class start time. Three tardies are equal to one absence. **In my efforts to set healthy boundaries for students and instructor, I reserve the right to drop any student missing three consecutive classes without contacting me.**

### Participation

Class participation is a large part of your final grade. Participation is demonstrated first by attendance, then by listening, taking notes, responding to, and asking questions, and interacting respectfully with others in group activities, critiques, and discussions. Understanding that students learn differently and have varying levels of comfort verbally engaging in class, I account for this by weighting written assignments and online discussions heavily. Students are expected to attend class prepared by having completed any readings and assignments and ask questions when needing clarification on anything. Please see attendance policy for more details on how attendance plays a role in your grade.

### Studio Assignments

Studio Assignments are the art projects you will work on throughout the course. Each module will have a different theme and set of Learning Objectives and consist of Studio Assignments (including a Written Statement), Sketchbook Assignments, Critiques, Work-in-Progress Critique Discussions, and Reading Discussions. Class critiques for each assignment will occur on the date

that the assignment is due. Please check the schedule regularly for these dates as they are a required part of your grade for each assignment.

### **Sketchbook Assignments**

A consistent sketchbook practice is essential. Each module's studio assignment is supported by sketchbook work—this may include research notes, idea maps, development sketches, technique exercises, and observation studies. Follow each module's requirements and deadlines; catching up last minute is not possible.

### **In-Progress Critiques**

In progress critique assignments provide an important opportunity for peer feedback before a studio assignment is due. You will be asked to showcase the progress of your studio assignment which often includes the artwork itself alongside a series of questions you will be asked to prepare based on prompts. In-progress critiques can also include: the sketches/studies for the assignment, material studies or practice, research notes, source materials, etc.

**A Reading Discussion Reflection** will be due for each module. These will be counted as part of your overall grade and must be completed on time. Please refer to the Discussion Reflection for instructions and refer to the schedule for the due dates. I'm committed to creating a respectful, inclusive learning environment—and I ask you to do the same. Our discussions should honor diverse perspectives across age, ability, race, religion, gender identity and expression, and sexual orientation.

### **Written Work and Discussion Posts**

For each studio project, a two-page written statement is due on the project's deadline. It should address the outcome of your project, how successful you feel the piece is and what you could have done differently to make it even better. You should also make a connection between your own work and the ideas presented in at least one of the assigned readings. For detailed guidelines on writing a successful statement please refer to the document "Statement Guidelines" found posted in Module 1 on Canvas.

*Students must check UNM emails regularly throughout the week in order to keep up with class announcements, instructor emails, etc.*

## EVALUATION AND GRADING

### Expectations

- Students complete and turn in all assignments promptly.
- Students engage authentically with each project and push yourself to grow creatively.
- Students actively and respectfully participate in class discussions and critiques.
- Students work, draw/practice, and read for this class at least 6-12 hours each week.
- Students maintain a research sketchbook that will be scanned and turned in for regular review.

### Studio Assignment Grading Rubric

All studio assignments will be graded using this rubric:

Execution	30%	Prompt completion of the project based on a firm understanding of the concept, discussions, and materials.
Presentation	25%	Your ideas are presented clearly using technical and conceptual skills
Participation	20%	Participation in critiques.
Statement	25%	Ability to articulate your process, reflect and make connections in writing. Connections between your work and the assigned readings

Look for the written feedback instructor has provided for each assignment. Contact the instructor directly and promptly to discuss a grade given to you on a project.

## **Grading and Lateness**

- All assignments must be submitted in person on the date they are due at the beginning of class. Please refer to the course schedule for specific due dates.
- Studio Assignments must be ready for critique on critique days at the beginning of class. Come to class early to hang your work, clean up detail, crop, etc. to ensure that your work is on time for critique. No altering of drawings during critique class time will be accepted.
- Assignments will be graded within 7 days of submission. There is a 2-day grace-period on all assignments meaning that as long as they are turned in within two days after the original due date, they will not receive a grade reduction. Assignments turned in within seven days of the original due date but after the 2-day grace period will receive a full letter grade reduction to their assignment grade. No late work will be accepted after 7 days of original due date and will not be graded unless direct communication with instructor is initiated by the student.
- Studio assignments that are not done on the due date will not be evaluated for group critique. This is a bummer to miss so be sure to prioritize turning in the larger studio assignments on time.
- If you are having difficulties keeping up with the course work, please contact your instructor(s) immediately. If you are having difficulties accessing the course materials online due to lack of internet or proper equipment, contact instructor as there are resources available to help.
