LATE SUBMISSION POLICY:

Deadlines are Friday nights at 11:59 (except for Week 1). Assignments are considered as on time or late based on the Canvas time stamp. **EVERY** assignment that arrives late will be penalized. Communicating with me in advance about exigent circumstances can earn you consideration – the consideration will be to have the penalty be reduced, not eliminated.

The penalty may be up to 35% of the assignment. Normally the penalty starts at only a few points for something that just misses the deadline and goes up as time passes. This means that there is no need to email and ask permission to submit late; the work will be accepted and there WILL be a late penalty. If something big happens that might affect your ability to submit for multiple weeks, then please let me know. I will work with you on how much the late penalty will be.

For all Week 1 to Week 7, the last day that work will be accepted is Saturday 5-9-2026 at 11:59pm. The Week 8 assignment will have a normal deadline of Friday 5-15-2026 at 11:59pm. It will NOT be accepted late.

If you need an exception to this policy, you will need to email your request **PRIOR** to 5pm the day **BEFORE** the deadline in question.

SUBMISSION FORMATS:

- You are free to work in the Word Processor of your choice (Docs, Pages, Word).
- All work should be saved and submitted as a Microsoft Word .doc or .docx file.
- I accept work as a PDF with a 10% penalty.
- I cannot open documents written in Pages.
- I do not open any links to a Google doc.

DROPPING THIS COURSE:

If something happens during the semester and you need to stop this class there are three available options.

You can Drop the course through LoboWeb or with the Registrar. This option is only available in the first weeks of the course, and the deadline is noted in the course calendar above. The result would be that the attempt to take this class will not even show up on your transcript.

You can Withdraw from the course through LoboWeb or with the Registrar. This process is available for more than half the course, but if you wait too long you will need to get a form signed by the Dean in order to be able to do so. The result would be a grade of W on your Transcript. Generally, this is better than getting an F, but please consult with an Academic Advisor to understand the impact of this on your GPA and/or financial Aid.

You could just stop submitting assignments. The result of that would be your grade would be based on whatever work has been submitted and graded. See the Grading section above for additional details.

An additional note that is not a part of that policy that I am sure will be at some point in the near future. The use ChatGPT and other such bots to create assignments will be considered to be academic dishonesty and will be reported to the University as such.

Turnitin:

All submissions to Canvas are checked for plagiarism by Turnitin. I check the report for every submission.

This program checks for two things. First a score for “Similarity” is produced. Basically it is checking for how similar is your work any others that have ever been submitted to the system. I am not expecting perfection on this score (total originality – there are only so many ways to describe Freud’s theories). If your similarity score is anything under 25% then I am not even worried. Scores even higher are often OK but might be a problem depending on the contents of the report.

The percentage that you see of you do not click in for the details is this one (The Similarity Report). If you click into the detailed report then you will also see a link to the AI Score report. The AI Score is what I am much more interested in.

The other thing that is checked is the risk that your work was produced by some sort of AI such as ChatGPT. If your score on that measure is over 30% then I will check the submission against an outside checker. Depending on the results of that check you may be asked to rewrite the assignment. You will see a score of 2 in the gradebook. The assignment can be rewritten and resubmitted for full credit. Work will not be graded until Turnitin shows a score of less than 20% on the AI Risk.

If you are using anything like Grammarly and it is telling you to fix more than a few words in your sentences then you are likely going to be flagged by the checker. You need to be doing the writing, not having AI write it for you.
