Student Learning Objectives: By the end of this **3 credit** hour course

1. Students will effectively communicate-expressively and receptively- at a basic level with the Deaf/Hard of Hearing individuals representing a cross-section of the Deaf community. (CCIE 7.1, 5.2, 5)
2. Students will demonstrate knowledge of the basic education and access issues faced by the American Deaf community. (CCIE 6.3, 6.4)
3. Students will demonstrate knowledge of the differences between American Sign Language (ASL) and manually coded English sign systems. (CCIE 7.4)
4. Students will identify basic linguistic principles and describe the history of the recognition of American Sign Language. (CCIE 7.1, 5.2, 5.3, 6.1)
5. Students will describe the cultural diversity and dynamics of the Deaf Community. (CCIE 5.5, 6.3)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course provides an overview of signed languages, including American Sign Language (ASL), signed English as well as signing systems that are used by deaf people. Cross-linguistic and cross-cultural information is discussed with the primary focus on ASL, signed English and fingerspelling. This course exposes students to the most common manually coded signed systems and discusses their historical relevance in the education of deaf people. Historical figures and linguists are highlighted and recognized for the development and use of American Sign Language in the United States. In addition to the acquisition of basic vocabulary and grammar, this course emphasizes knowledge of the characteristics and values of Deaf Culture.

This is a three credit-hour course. Class meets for two 75-minute sessions of direct instruction for fifteen weeks during a semester. Please plan for a *minimum* of six hours of out-of-class work (or homework, study, assignment completion, and class preparation) each week.

This is an accelerated course that requires a great deal of discipline and practice both inside and outside of class time. Please come to class prepared to communicate and participate in group activities using the signs you are learning. Class sessions are Face to Face during the scheduled time and day. Additionally, resources and assignments are posted on CANVAS.

You are required to have at least one practice partner that you connect with outside for one (1) hour per week to have conversations using your developing skills. This is critical in developing your expressive and receptive skills. Each week you will submit a report summarizing what you and your partner talked about and reflect on your personal growth. The reports will follow a provided template and will be submitted on CANVAS every Thursday before 11 PM. Template is included in this syllabus.

Assignments

Students will be asked to complete a few required assignments to support the learning objectives of this course. A written assignment, following the reading of the *Learning to See* text, will be assigned during the first six weeks of the semester. The **ASL History Written Assignment** provides students the opportunity to reflect, synthesize, and review important topics that will be covered on the first and second written exam. A **Classifier Assignment**, due around the middle of the semester, will ask students to complete a minute long recording of themselves describing an event using all classifiers. Students will be placed in groups online and asked to engage with each other about each person's video through the discussion board application in Canvas. **Prior to each receptive exam (3 total), students will be assigned a Receptive Review Assignment** to help them prepare for each exam. It will be the responsibility of students to remain caught up with all vocabulary taught in class prior to these assignments. Students will watch a video of the instructor signing sentences using various vocabulary learned and asked to translate the sentences in English to turn in. This assignment mimics the format of a receptive exam and provides a focused way of studying for these exams. Lastly, there are a few **Reflection Assignments** that will follow short reading assignments and class discussions requiring students to answer open ended questions and/or multiple-choice questions about what they have learned. These assignments are due toward the end of the semester and assist students in preparing for final exams. **The culmination of assignments completed in this course are worth 10% of the student's total grade.** All assignment requirements and details will be made available in Canvas.

ATTENDANCE

In person attendance is mandatory. Attendance will be taken daily. Three late arrivals will reflect on your grade as one absence. This includes arriving late or leaving class early.

Students who miss **4 consecutive classes** may be dropped from the course as per UNM Pathfinder. However, students should not assume that non-attendance will result in being dropped from class. It is the student's responsibility to initiate drops or complete withdrawals within published deadlines utilizing the appropriate process. Any missed activities, quizzes/tests, or assignments cannot be made up without a documented excuse. **All make-up exams must be scheduled within two days of**

the original date, taken within a week of the exam date and may be subject to 10-point deduction from final score. Again, documentation must be provided to schedule a make-up exam.

CLASS PARTICIPATION

Class participation is essential in class. The key advantage of class participation is that it encourages each student to be well-prepared and thus become an active, rather than a passive learner. Participation also provides you with the opportunity to gain from the experiences and talents of everyone in the class. Please feel free to ask questions, provide supportive comments, or challenge constructively what has been said. Those who participate regularly and well will benefit. If you are within one point of the next higher grade level, you will earn the higher grade. For example, if a student had an 89 average and had participated regularly and well the student would receive an A- rather than a B+ for the course. This does not apply for grades between an A and an A+ (check grading chart below).
