Goals of this course: To reinforce the following painting techniques and concepts learned in Arts 207:

1. To teach you the techniques of acrylic painting.
2. To introduce and/or reinforce your knowledge of compositional principles.
3. To have you understand how to make color choices using the color wheel.
4. To introduce and/or reinforce the concepts of color properties: value, intensity and hue.
5. To employ these concepts in effective paint mixing techniques.
6. To explore surface treatments such as the layering/glazing of colors, smooth application of acrylic paint as well as textured application.
7. To introduce you to pertinent work of a variety of painters throughout the history of art
8. To involve you in class discussions in order to increase and reinforce your understanding of the concepts, techniques and art vocabulary introduced via the painting assignments.
9. To demonstrate how to stretch and prepare your own canvas.
10. To learn appropriate framing techniques and presentation of finished work.

Arts 208 will require two assigned paintings followed by five paintings based on each student's interests. I can assign further paintings if the student has no particular path to follow.

My expectations:

- I expect you to be in class on time and throughout the assigned class hours.
