Course Descriptions

This course is the second part of a college level introduction to Spanish that promotes language learning in a cultural context. This course will develop students' communicative language with clear and comprehensive grammatical coverage by the presentation of functional language, role-play, small group and personalized activities. Students will engage in cross-cultural comparisons in reading, writing, listening and interview activities. Prerequisite: For Spanish 102 is Spanish 101.

You must register on the iLRn site by the end of the week one class.

Technology Requirements

This class was designed for people who are comfortable with technology. We will be learning via various modes; videos, audio, visual presentations, and navigating the web. The class will be intense for those who are not comfortable with multimodal instruction that uses various sites to complete your assignments. Be aware that you will be responsible for becoming familiar with all the tools required to complete your assignments. Also be aware that help is always available through campus technology, website assistance, or the instructor. If you are computer and internet savvy, this class is for you.

In the event of technical difficulties, use the screenshot feature to copy the error message you received, attach it to an email and send it to me via email (preferably Blackboard email) in order for your assignment to be accepted. No late assignments will be accepted without proof of technical issues.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS/ATTENDANCE

Attendance: Attendance will be recorded by assignment and discussion submissions. Submitting an assignment and participating in discussion check-ins will count as class attendance. The instructor will keep track of attendance. A student with excessive absences—15% of total class hours—may be dropped from the class. Students should not assume they will be dropped from the class automatically. Absences do not relieve students from the responsibility for missed assignments and exams. Failure to attend the first week of class will result in the student being dropped. Moreover, for online classes your Blackboard grammar assignments will be counted as attendance and participation. Failure to complete two grammar assignments consecutively on Blackboard will be noted as non-attendance and will result in being dropped from the class.

ONLINE WORKBOOK and LABMANUAL: The online workbook and lab manual provides practice of the material presented in your textbook. It is divided into a Workbook section, which focuses on vocabulary, grammar, reading, and writing practice; and a Laboratory Manual section, which focuses on pronunciation and listening comprehension. The online work provides immediate feedback so you can monitor your progress. All online exercises should be submitted before or on the assigned due date. Late work will not be accepted. The reason for requiring that online exercises be completed by the scheduled due date is because this is not a self-paced course and will have homework due each week so that the student has sufficient opportunity to master the material presented in class and is optimally prepared to take tests at the end of each chapter.

Presentations: In lieu of a midterm each student will be assigned a Spanish speaking country. In a PowerPoint presentation you will focus on some of the following topics: food, culture, traditions, history, languages, government ect. More information and a Rubric will be provided. Presentations total 20% of the final grade.

Quizzes and Exams: There will be a quiz at the end of each chapter on specific topics at the instructor's discretion. There are no make-up quizzes; however, the instructor will drop the lowest quiz score at the end of the semester. Thus, should a student miss a scheduled quiz due to unavoidable circumstances, the grading consequences are minimized. Only one 'drop' is allowed. Quizzes will become unavailable after the due date. Please ensure that you prepare ahead of time to complete your quizzes before the due date. All quizzes will be due on a Sunday before midnight. There will be a **mandatory final exam** covering the material in Lecciones 6 through 10.

Conversation: Our conversations will take place via Flipgrid. To create a free account, go to www.flipgrid.com. Register for a free account and set up your profile. You can also use a smart phone. The purpose of this forum is to create a virtual conversation with the class. An audio response is mandatory to receive conversation credit.

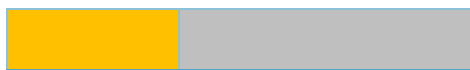
