Course Description

This course is a chronological treatment of the history of the western world from ancient times to the early modern era. The elements of this course are designed to inform students on the major events and trends that are essential in the understanding of the development of western civilization within the context of world societies. Selective attention will be given to "non-western" civilizations which impact and influence the development of "western" civilization. Meets New Mexico General Education Curriculum Area 5: Humanities.

Learning Outcomes

1. Students will be able to EXPLAIN in their work how humans in the past shaped their own unique historical moments and were shaped by those moments, and how those cultures changed over the course of the centuries for the history of the western world from ancient times to the early modern era.
2. Students will DISTINGUISH between primary and secondary sources, IDENTIFY and EVALUATE evidence and EMPATHIZE with people in their historical context.
3. Students will SUMMARIZE and APPRAISE different historical interpretations and evidence in order to CONSTRUCT past events.
4. Students will IDENTIFY historical arguments in a variety of sources and EXPLAIN how they were constructed, EVALUATING credibility, perspective, and relevance.
5. Students will CREATE well-supported historical arguments and narratives that demonstrate an awareness of audience.
6. Students will APPLY historical knowledge and historical thinking **"in order to infer what drives and motivates human behavior in both past and present."**

There are three essential skills required: Information & Digital Literacy, Personal & Social Responsibility, and Critical Thinking. These skills will be evaluated with the following assessments: Discussions, Journals, and Final Project.

Consulting Your Instructor

My goal is to assist you in developing a meaningful understanding of history and to help you achieve the highest grade you are capable of. A constructive, mutually respectful attitude in all matters will greatly facilitate this process. I will be available to discuss your questions and concerns during the office hours stated at the top of this syllabus. You can also make an appointment for either an in-person or online meeting at a different time by emailing me.

Email: Please note: I will not open any email that does not show a recognizable name in the send field and this course number in the subject field. I check email daily and will respond to emails within 24 hours during the week and 48 hours on the weekend. Note also that you will not receive a grade for any paper submitted via an email attachment that does not show your name on the first page.

Regarding Online Office Hours: I will be using Zoom for office hours this semester. Zoom has audio and video capabilities as well as the ability for me to share what I'm doing on the computer, so it does work well in these kinds of situations. You can book a time through [You Can Book Me](#) that works with your schedule. I've set up evening hours on Wednesdays and Thursdays; however, you can contact me via email to set up times that are not available on the You Can Book Me calendar.

TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS & TECHNICAL SKILLS

This course will be completed entirely in the online Blackboard Learn environment. Regular access to a computer and basic computer literacy skills are therefore required. Additionally, you will need internet access, basic word processing software (Microsoft Word, Open Office, etc), and Adobe Reader (to access .pdf files). The instructor WILL NOT provide tutorials or training on how to use Blackboard. There are, however, online and face to face tutorials available through UNM Learn here: <http://online.unm.edu/help/learn/students/>. These are also available within Blackboard.

Skills needed for this course include using Blackboard, using email with attachments, creating and submitting files in Word or PDF formats

ATTENDANCE/PARTICIPATION REQUIREMENTS

Attendance in an online environment: This is not a self-paced course. If a student does not log in and/or complete the assigned tasks for two weeks, in a row or at any two points in the course, he or she will be dropped from the course. Signing in to Blackboard without completing assignments does not constitute participate in the class. Although the course is not self-paced, you do have the opportunity to work ahead. If you choose to do so, remember that you will need to return to the discussion board on Wednesday evenings or Thursdays to respond to the comments of your classmates. Also, be aware that I will not grade any assignments until after the due date given in the syllabus.

You will need to plan specific blocks of time each week to dedicate to this class. To successfully complete all the work, you should plan on at least 12-16 hours each week for this 8-week course. I tell you this so that you can remember to set aside time that you will dedicate specifically to this course. It is easy to put online classes on the back burner and forget about them. Please do not do that! Devise a weekly schedule that fits your life and allows you to complete all the assignments by the time they are due each week.

Course Requirements

General Organization

This class is divided into eight one-week segments. In weeks 2-8 you will read two or three chapters in your textbook, complete assignments online using the Launch Pad Access Code, submit assignments for our class timeline, and submit either a journal in which you analyze the chapters through specific questions or participate in a discussion forum.

Readings and Quizzes

Each student is required to read the assigned chapters and complete quizzes for each chapter. The quizzes will be completed in Macmillan LaunchPad (the link is provided in Blackboard). There is an adaptive exercise called Learning Curve for each chapter. There is also an extra credit “summative” quiz of approximately 11 or 12 questions for each chapter. Learning Curve is designed so that if you keep working at it you can always earn 100%. It also allows you to click on links that will take you to the appropriate section in the electronic textbook before you answer the question. These are due the second Monday of each unit.

Discussion Forums/Journals

In weeks 2 – 8 you will choose whether to participate in a discussion forum or submit a journal. You do not need to do both assignments and you can choose each week which to do. The discussion forums in these weeks are in addition to the introduction discussion forum and the discussion forum over history and historical thinking (both of which are required and part of the first week assignments). If you decide to participate in the discussions the initial posts will be due on the second Thursday of the unit with responses due the second Sunday. If you decide to submit a journal, the journals are due each Sunday by midnight. In these journals you will reflect on what you have learned in the unit by responding to specific questions, as specified in the [Journal Instructions](#).

Timelines

As a class we will be constructing a [timeline](#) of Early Western Civilization history. We will use Tiki-Tokifor this and will all be contributing to the same timeline.

Final Assignment

Each student will also complete a [final assignment](#) that asks you to think critically about your own timeline posts and draw some conclusions. In the assignment you will create your own personal timeline and submit your conclusions.

Other Assignments

Each student is asked to complete a [first week assignment](#) that addresses course requirements as well as personal reflection of what is needed to be successful in the class.

1. Read the assigned chapters
 2. Complete the quizzes
 3. Submit a journal or participate in a discussion
 4. Submit both timeline assignments
