

### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

Introduction to the historical, philosophical, sociological foundations of education, current trends, and issues in education; especially as they relate to a multicultural/diverse environment. Students will use those foundations to develop effective strategies related to challenges, issues, and responsibilities in the field of education. A field component at an educational site is required.

#### STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Describe the teaching and learning of various American education settings including early childhood, elementary, middle school, high school, and special education.
- 2. Describe how teachers use educational theory and the results of research of students' learning.
- 4. Explain the techniques for establishing a positive, supportive and inclusive environment in the classroom
- 5. Identify and describe instructional strategies supported by current research to promote critical thinking skills of all learners.
- 6. Recognize the teachers' role and responsibilities in an increasingly diverse, multicultural society.

### **EDUCATION GOALS**

#### You will be able to:

- 1. Reflect on your own educational history and determine how that has influenced your perspective of education and your decision to become a teacher.
- 2. Analyze how being a reflective teacher will strengthen your pedagogical skills and ensure that you are a lifelong learner and remain in the teaching field.
- 3. Examine different teaching and learning philosophies and determine which teaching philosophy you are most closely aligned to and why.
- 4. Explain how the learning environment affects students social emotional learning and academic learning to include multicultural aspects.



#### This summer we will:

- Maintain a journal in electronic and/or hard copy form to be uploaded into the system
  documenting your personal journey through this course. How does your perspective of
  education grow and change? What are some of the challenges you face throughout the course
  and how do you attempt to reconcile those challenges?
- Think critically about the history/beginnings of the educational system K-12 and the connection to ways that the educational systems operates today and considerations for future system(s).
- Communicate your understanding of educational theories and their relationship to existing systems such as standardized assessments, professional organizations, teacher education, and teacher retention.
- Observe in a classroom setting at the level in which you intend to teach such as preschool, elementary, middle school, or high school. If you are observing at the middle or high school level, you must select the subject area you are interested in teaching or most closely aligned.

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### STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS AND EMAIL:

COVID-19 Requirements: The University of New Mexico requires that all faculty, staff, and students accessing University facilities, housing, programs, services, and activities in person be fully vaccinated for COVID-19, subject to limited exemptions. Proof of vaccination and booster, or a medical, religious, or online remote exemption, must be uploaded to the UNM vaccination verification site.
